(Continued from page one) the limited expenditure. While variety adds zest to appetite, it is pointed out that menus planned on a very low cost basis can cater only to healthy, normal appetites.

Evaporated milk and dried milk are inexpensive and easily handled and are valuable foods. The bulletin points out. It urges families following low cost menus to provide each child with a quart and each adult with a pint of whole milk each day. Eggs, at least three or four a week for each child under six are essential, the bulletin says. Copies may be had from any of the county agents.
