**No Marked Changes In The Wheat Market**

No outstanding changes occurred in the general wheat market situation during the week. Harvesting of spring wheat has been practically completed in the United States and is well under way in Canada. Threshing has started at a few points in southern Saskatchewan and also in the earlier districts of Alberta. Trade estimates now place the Canadian harvest at between 250,000,000 bushels and 290,000,000 bushels. Threshing of winter wheat is well under way in Europe but unsettled weather has hindered harvesting in Russia and trade reports indicate a crop of only about sufficient for domestic needs.

The Agricultural Adjustment Administration announced its decision to authorize in connection with the 1935 wheat program the planting of 90 percent of the base acreage of signers of wheat adjustment contracts. About 51,500,000 acres of the nation's base wheat acreage of 66,000,000 acres is covered by the contracts, which have been signed by producers. Planting of 90 percent, or approximately 46,000,000 acres of this land would be authorized under the plan.
