HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

During these early fall days the question of how to serve tomatoes is a pressing one to all housewives, not only to those having access to homegrown ones but to those tempted by the quantities now appearing in the markets. The tomato, popular long before its great nutritive value was realized, is now considered one of the most valuable foods in the American diet.

The food value of the tomato is much the same as that of the orange, grapefruit and lemon, being rich in vitamins A, B and C. Because of its richness in the vitamins and of the fact that its content of vitamin C is not reduced much, if any, by canning, it has been widely used in recent years. They are excellent for adding flavor to the more bland foods like rice, macaroni, etc.

There are literally scores of ways to serve tomatoes because they combine so well with many foods. Raw, cooked or canned they can be served at any meal or in any part of a meal. Here are a few ways to serve tomatoes:

- Cream Tomato Sauce: 6 firm medium tomatoes, 1-2 cup well seasoned French Dressing, 2 tsp. cracker crumbs, 2 tsp. butter, melted, 1-2 cup grated cheese. Wash and cut thin slices from the top of each tomato, then hollow them out slightly. Place 1 tsp. French Dressing in the hollow of each tomato. Combine the cracker crumbs, cheese and melted butter, and use to fill each tomato. Arrange on a baking pan. Bake in a moderate oven of 375 degrees for about 20 minutes, or until tender. Two or three times during the baking baste them with some of the dressing. Tomato and Cottage Cheese: Remove the pulp from the center of 6 tomatoes. Mix pulp with one cup of cottage cheese and 1-2 cup of sliced stuffed olives. Refill centers of tomatoes with this mixture. Serve on crisp lettuce with French Dressing. Baked Stuffed Tomatoes & Peas: 6 medium tomatoes, 1 tsp. salt, 2 cups peas, 2 tsp. butter, 1-2 cup buttered crumbs, Speck pepper. Remove the centers of the tomatoes, reserving the pulp. Chop this pulp and combine with the drained peas, ths salt, pepper, and melted butter. Sprinkle the inside of the tomatoes with salt. Fill with this mixture and top with the buttered crumbs. Bake in moderate oven for 30 minutes.

- Dressing: 6 firm medium tomatoes, 1-2 cup well seasoned French Dressing, 2 tsp. cracker crumbs, 2 tsp. butter, melted, 1-2 cup grated cheese. Wash and cut thin slices from the top of each tomato, then hollow them out slightly. Place 1 tsp. French Dressing in the hollow of each tomato. Combine the cracker crumbs, cheese and melted butter, and use to fill each tomato. Arrange on a baking pan. Bake in a moderate oven of 375 degrees for about 20 minutes, or until tender. Two or three times during the baking baste them with some of the dressing. Tomato and Cottage Cheese: Remove the pulp from the center of 6 tomatoes. Mix pulp with one cup of cottage cheese and 1-2 cup of sliced stuffed olives. Refill centers of tomatoes with this mixture. Serve on crisp lettuce with French Dressing. Baked Stuffed Tomatoes & Peas: 6 medium tomatoes, 1 tsp. salt, 2 cups peas, 2 tsp. butter, 1-2 cup buttered crumbs, Speck pepper. Remove the centers of the tomatoes, reserving the pulp. Chop this pulp and combine with the drained peas, ths salt, pepper, and melted butter. Sprinkle the inside of the tomatoes with salt. Fill with this mixture and top with the buttered crumbs. Bake in moderate oven for 30 minutes.
