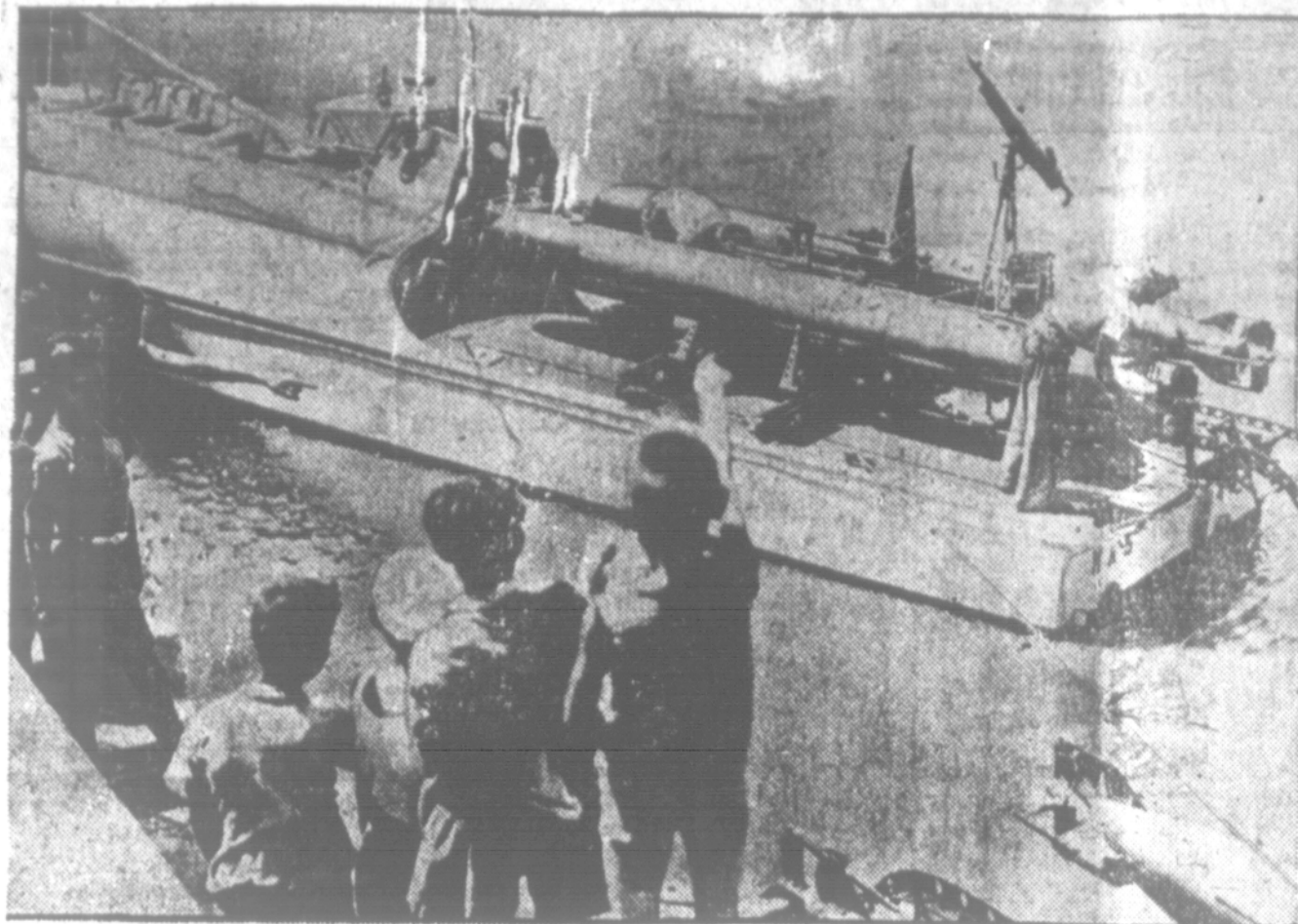
The Woodmen lodge of Moro has surrendered its charter and remaining members will belong to the order located in The Dalles. W. C. Fredden is clerk there.

### Big Parade Is On Friday

Friday, September 14, is the day for the famous "Westward Ho" parade at the Silver Jubilee Pendleton Round-Up and the Round-up association has received many indications that the public, remembering that the parade was held on Saturday in former years, hopes that the word will get around so that visitors will not be disappointed. The Round-up now in readiness, will be held three days, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, September 13, 14, and 15.

On Friday, the second day the longest and most colorful and most historically accurate "Westward Ho" parade ever presented will be the most outstanding feature of Pendleton's great western exhibition, according to the Round-up board. Parade director George Strand has many historic relics of the northwest never before shown and the line of march will be ten blocks longer than in any former year. The parade will be a thrilling panorama of the old west. Explorers, trappers, gold seekers, pioneers, Indian fighters—in fact, the entire life of the early days, will be faithfully represented. And all of the ancient forms of transportation will be seen—covered wagons, pack trains, buckboards, stage coaches and the pony express. Scores of full blooded Indians will be on the war path and several fine bands will be in line, including the renowned Cowboy Mounted Band and a 60 piece band from LaGrande.

With the Round-up in readiness, Pendleton's streets are already teeming with thousands of visitors, making it virtually certain that attendance records for

the past ten years will be broken. The Round-up association gives the assurance that there will be no advance in prices of any commodities in Pendleton during the show and points out the fact that ticket prices, reduced nearly one half to meet depression conditions last year will remain at the same low level. The Round-up will nevertheless be complete as in former years, with arena competition of true World's Championship caliber. "Happy Canyon" famous nightly pageant, will be presented each evening with 200 Indians participating. And 2,000 Indians from the neighboring reservations will appear in the Round-up arena each after noon in war dances. The Indian village on the Round-up grounds has double the number of teepees that it had last year, and is thrown open to visitors, as usual.

Pete Knight, world's champion bronc rider, has entered to defend his title and more entries in bucking, bulldogging and roping have been made this year than for five years past. Several first class relay strings have been entered in the Cowboy's relay races the thrilling stagecoach races and Pony Express races will be held as usual.

In addition, there will be a "Wild Ride" each day in the arena a new feature. Fifteen bucking horses are saddled, mounted and released simultaneously in the arena in the "Wild Ride" The Round-up, celebrating its Silver Jubilee anniversary, will be better than ever its veteran directors assert.
