### Many Debt Adjustment Problems Settled

Probably three fourths to four fifths of Oregon's farm debt adjustment cases are already settled, according to information given out at a meeting of the state agricultural advisory council held recently in Salem. However, at least several hundred cases are still not adjusted, some of which are a good deal more difficult than average reported L. R. Brittain, college extension economist and secretary of the council.

E. M. Ehrhardt, president of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, told the members that that institution has closed approximately 5500 farm loans in Oregon since May, 1933, for nearly 15 million dollars. About one-fourth as many additional loans are approved and pending, of which from 500 to 600 involve debt adjustment before they can be closed, he said.

This record of loans made and pending, together with a large volume of farm debt adjustment and refinancing done in connection with other farm mortgage credit agencies, has greatly relieved the farm debt situation as compared with the extremely critical condition which prevailed two years ago. Officials of the land bank present at the meeting gave hearty credit to Oregon's 250 state and county farm debt adjustment committees for having rendered unusually outstanding service in the farm refinancing program.

In addition to state council members, the meeting was attended by several county farm debt adjustment committees, a party of county agents who are serving as county conciliation commissioners, rural rehabilitation officials and others interested in the financial rehabilitation of farmers who are over burdened with debt. O. M. Plummer, chairman of the council, presided, and E. A. McCormack, vice chairman reported on the status of the job.

After a thorough discussion of the provisions of the Frazier Lend Lease farm bankruptcy plan, it was the general conclusion that the bankruptcy plan is not likely to apply except in cases which cannot be settled satisfactorily by conciliation. Plans for continuing the farm debt adjustment work were considered by the council, with particular reference to slow and tough cases.

The meeting adjourned after voting to meet again at the Pacific International Livestock Show in Portland about October 10.

ment to the folly of man. This gigantic figure does not even include the millions of acres of overgrazed range lands or timbered areas nor the vast areas abandoned in the drought stricken states this year.

High production may not be immediately reduced by erosion. However, it is plainly evident that economical production on land cannot continue when the fertile topsoil is being carried away by sheet washing; when soil slips and landslides are making steep slopes unfit for cultivation; and when gullies are cutting field after field into small unprofitable strips.

Every farmer realizes that he is not concerned so much with the yield as he is with the profit and loss on the deal. When the farms become riddled with gullies and clay ridges require fertilizer, the farming costs increase and the net return must necessarily decrease. If the farmers of the United States are to reap the largest net returns, now and in the future, their program will change from one of soil mining to one of soil conservation. Only by an immediate realization of the problem and the cooperation of every citizen can we keep the United States from following in the footsteps of China as a land of floods and famines.

With school days again upon us a lesson in school lunches will not be amiss. Children usually develop healthy appetites during the vacation months with long hours of play in the sunshine and the question of finicky appetites is not one to worry most mothers. But school day appetites are often more difficult to satisfy. The long hours in doors under the strain and excitement of school life often shows in loss of appetites. For this reason special attention must be paid to the school lunch.

A regular formula for school lunches and one that can be worked for home lunches too, should contain milk to drink or two foods containing milk; a vegetable besides potato, or fruit; two servings of some substantial food such as bread and butter, potatoes, macaroni, beans, meat, etc. A simple dessert may be served with this meal, but it is not considered essential to a good lunch.
