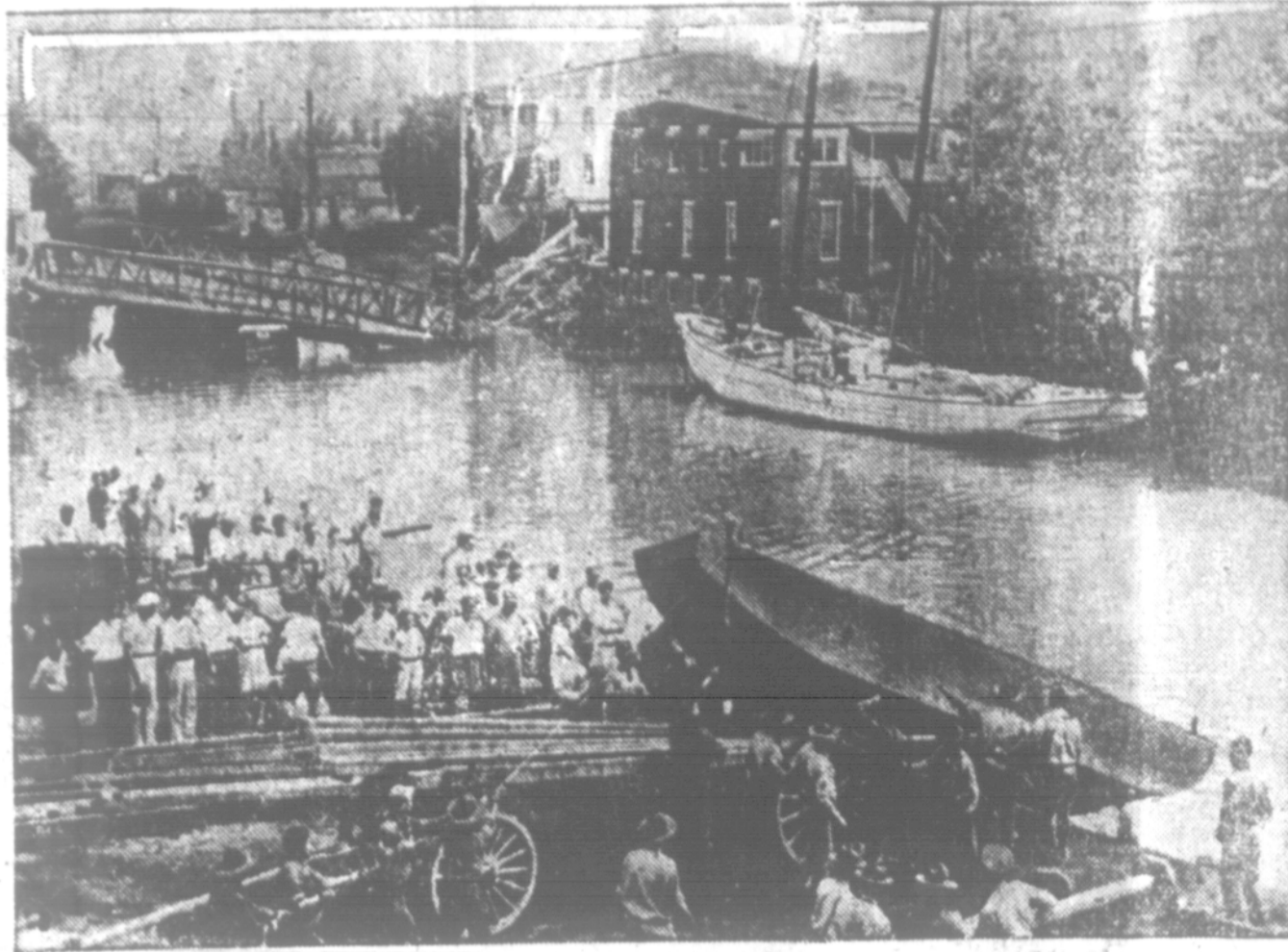
The September 25th monthly social of the Rebekah lodge will mark the 32nd anniversary of the lodge. All Rebekahs and their husbands and wives are invited to attend.

Alarming increases in Oregon's auto accident death and injury record, which has impelled inauguration of a statewide 12 week safety campaign by the Oregon State Motor association, Parent-Teacher association, American Legion and other groups, continued during August, according to reports from the office of P. J. Stedman, secretary of state.

Twenty four persons were killed and 416 injured during the month in 1933, bringing the totals since January 1 to 190 fatalities and 3068 injuries in 13,068 accidents. These figures represent a 7.50 percent increase in accidents, a 20 percent increase in injuries, and a 26 percent increase in deaths, over figures for the same period of 1933.

Beginning September 23, law enforcement agencies throughout the state will concentrate on motorists who violate right of way laws during the ensuing 2 weeks. Following two week periods will see concentration of enforcement on failure to heed signs and signals; driving while intoxicated; turning right or left from wrong traffic lanes, and driving with defective mechanical equipment.

Speeding has been the subject of the two week drive which started the campaign September 9, and since officers declare most serious accidents result from this cause the program of education and enforcement of laws against fast driving will be continued during the five other two week periods.

- Who May Apply?**  
Any property owner, individual, partnership or corporation with a regular income from salary, commissions, business or other assured sources (it is not necessary to be a depositor in the financial institution consulted). Note: Mortgage, if any, must be in good standing and no past-due taxes, interest or lien against the property.
- To Whom Do I Apply?**  
To any national bank, state bank or trust company, savings bank, building and loan association or finance company approved by the Federal Housing Administration, or to a contractor or building supply dealer.
- How Much May I Borrow?**  
From one hundred to two thousand dollars, depending on your income, for improvements on any one property. A like amount in connection with not more than five properties.
- How Long May Notes Run?**  
For any number of months from one to three years.
- What Security Is Required?**  
Only that you have an adequate regular income and a good credit record in your community.
- What is the Cost of This Credit?**  
The financial institution may not collect an interest and (or) discount and (or) fee of any kind a total charge in excess of an amount equivalent to \$5.00 per \$100.00 of the original face amount of a one-year note, deductible in advance.
