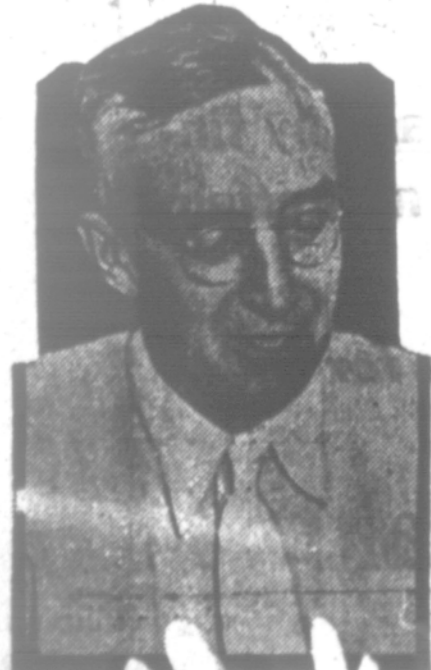

CORN-HOGS

(Continued from page one) ton and growing out of the recent regional conference, in one of which extension officials of Oregon State college took part.

AAA officials foresee serious difficulties in the next few years if the natural reaction from present drought conditions are allowed to develop as they have in past years into a cycle which will carry production of forage crops to the opposite extreme stimulated by scarcity and high prices of the present.

Such a condition, they believe, would be disastrous to the corn and other forage crop producers and the livestock growers as well, particularly the hog growers in the corn belt states.

In order to get a definite expression of opinion from growers themselves, the AAA officials have requested the state extension services to arrange for the taking of a referendum by each corn-hog county association on the following questions:

1. Do you favor an adjustment program dealing with corn and hogs in 1935?

2. Do you favor a one-contract dealing with grains and livestock to become effective in 1936?

It is explained that if the producers vote favorably on the first question, AAA officials will confer further with representatives of producers in developing details of a suitable contract. Any 1935 program will follow the general outline of the 1934 program but benefit payments would probably be somewhat larger for corn and materially less for hogs than under the program this year.

In voting on the question, western producers will be faced with the fact that this region is a deficit area for both corn and hogs. Suggestion was once made that control of too rapid expansion in hog production be attempted wholly through a contract dealing with corn production alone, but western men objected strenuously to this at the recent Salt Lake conference contending that it would be unfair to continue the processing tax on hogs and pay out the proceeds entirely to corn growers.

EROSION SERVICE

(Continued from page one) to assist Mr. Hill in his work in the Willamette Project.

The complete program to be carried out in the region will include:

1. Modified tillage methods and special studies to determine what tillage practices can be used to keep run-off and erosion on a minimum.

2. Growing of more legumes and grasses to build up the soil and to decrease run-off and erosion.

3. The construction of Mechanical control such as terraces to reduce run-off and dams to repair some of the damage which has already been done.

4. The treatment of the uncultivated headwaters both by vegetation and mechanical controls. This will consist of the construction of

terraces and dams and increasing the plant cover in order to put the water into the soil rather than allow it to run off in floods.

Further good news comes with the statement that the AAA is cooperating with the Soil Erosion Service so that the farmers may use their contracted acres for erosion control crops or grasses. Additional encouragement is seen in the fact that in all cases changes in the use of the land will be made with as little disturbance as possible of the regular farming system.

While it is impossible to know exactly whether the farm income will be materially changed under these plans, it is certain that this program of better land use will result in a balanced, more permanent agriculture.

Erosion control is not the only benefit that will result. It is plain evidence that such a program will greatly reduce run-off. With the reduction of run-off, erosion of the fertile farm lands will be greatly reduced. In this same connection, the flood hazard will be decreased and the increased amount of water penetrating the soil will result in building up our water supply. The lowering of wells and the drying up of springs and streams the last few summers have brought home to us more forcibly than ever the fact that we must keep water where it falls so that our water supply may be obtained.

It might be further noted that this program will also decrease the spreading of weed seed by run-off and will protect our highways from floods and muddy inundations. Thus, this unified program of erosion control becomes connected with all phases of conservation and with the maintaining of a more permanent profitable agriculture.
