**Farmers Refinancing With Federal Loans**  
 Reflecting an important growth in service to Pacific northwest agriculture, the Federal Intermediate Credit bank of Spokane topped all previous records during the first nine months of the year by advancing a total of \$50,262,258 on livestock paper and farm commodity warehouse receipts, including renewals.

Loans and discounts outstanding on September 28 were \$35,964,068, showing a gain of \$14,546,792 over the same period in 1933. This impressive increase is accounted for largely by the volume of new business derived from the 31 production credit associations organized last spring, and by the re-discounting of a substantial volume of loans for the Regional Agricultural Credit corporation of this district.

The Intermediate Credit bank does not make loans direct to individual farmers but serves as a "credit reservoir" or "federal reserve" system for agriculture discounting crop and livestock paper for qualified local loan agencies, bank and farm cooperatives. Its loanable funds come from the sale of short-term debentures to the investing public. The standing of these debentures is so high that since last May the bank has been able to market its issues at 1 per cent interest, thereby giving its borrowers the record low discount rate of 2 per cent.

So that farmers might more directly gain advantage from this great reservoir of economical credit, congress (in the farm credit of 1933) provided for the organization of a net work of local farmer-owned production credit associations authorized to discount through the Intermediate Credit bank. Now by using these combined facilities, producers are able to reach into the big money markets and obtain their operating funds under the same favorable terms enjoyed only by "big business" heretofore.

In addition to this new range of business to farmers, the Intermediate Credit bank is continuing to fill an important mission by advancing funds to cooperative marketing groups on their staple stored products, thereby contributing to orderly marketing. Up to October 1, commitments totaling \$2,850,000 were made to cooperatives handling wheat, apples, prunes, seeds, canned products, etc. These associations are receiving the benefits of a broad firming of prices this year, which will be reflected back to their producer-members in higher returns than would have prevailed had their products been dumped onto the market.
