Infantile Paralysis
Not in Epidemic Form

There has been no great increase in the number of infantile paralysis cases in this state. It is true that we have had a few sporadic cases but in no part of the state has the disease appeared in the form of an epidemic and there

is no apparent sign that we are due for an epidemic. Every year we have a number of children that contract this disease but this is also true of practically every state in the Union.

A weekly index shows that Oregon has been free of infantile paralysis than any other state in the Northwest.

Infantile paralysis is a serious disease and every precaution should be taken for its prevention. Young children should not be taken to public gathering places. As long as this disease persists in our neighboring states it will be well to restrict children to their own neighborhood.

It is particularly important that children be kept away from sick persons no matter what the disease may be. Infantile paralysis is probably transmitted from person to person by secretions from the mouth, by talking, sneezing and coughing. All sick children should be completely isolated. This, of course, is more important with common colds or other acute infections.

While as a preventive measure gatherings of large groups of children have been discouraged, it is advised that they go about their usual occupations with the knowledge that the danger is not more than ordinary and better precautions are being taken for their protection.

Convalescent serum and serum from healthy adults is claimed to have a possible value in preventing infantile paralysis. Your physician should be consulted in regard to the advisability of using this serum.
Outdoor life is helpful in building up resistance. Fatigue should be avoided and special attention given to personal hygiene.

step which the rate order forces us to take.

"We fully recognize that rate reductions are always welcomed by our patrons. We have made them whenever it has been possible to do so without impairing the quality of our service or our financial stability. This recent order, however, while making a small reduction in rates to the individual means such a loss to us, aggregating over \$365,000 per year, that our present low earnings will be reduced to 1 percent per annum on the value of the property. Further, the order reduces the value of the property by \$10,000,000, a reduction amounting to over 30 percent. It is at once apparent that these differences are substantial and not minor concessions the company might make.

"We had hoped that this order would be a constructive one and would deal fairly and justly with all parties involved. Needless to say, the findings, which we feel are unjust, have been a great disappointment to us.
"We desire to merit the public's confidence and good will. An understanding of all the facts will

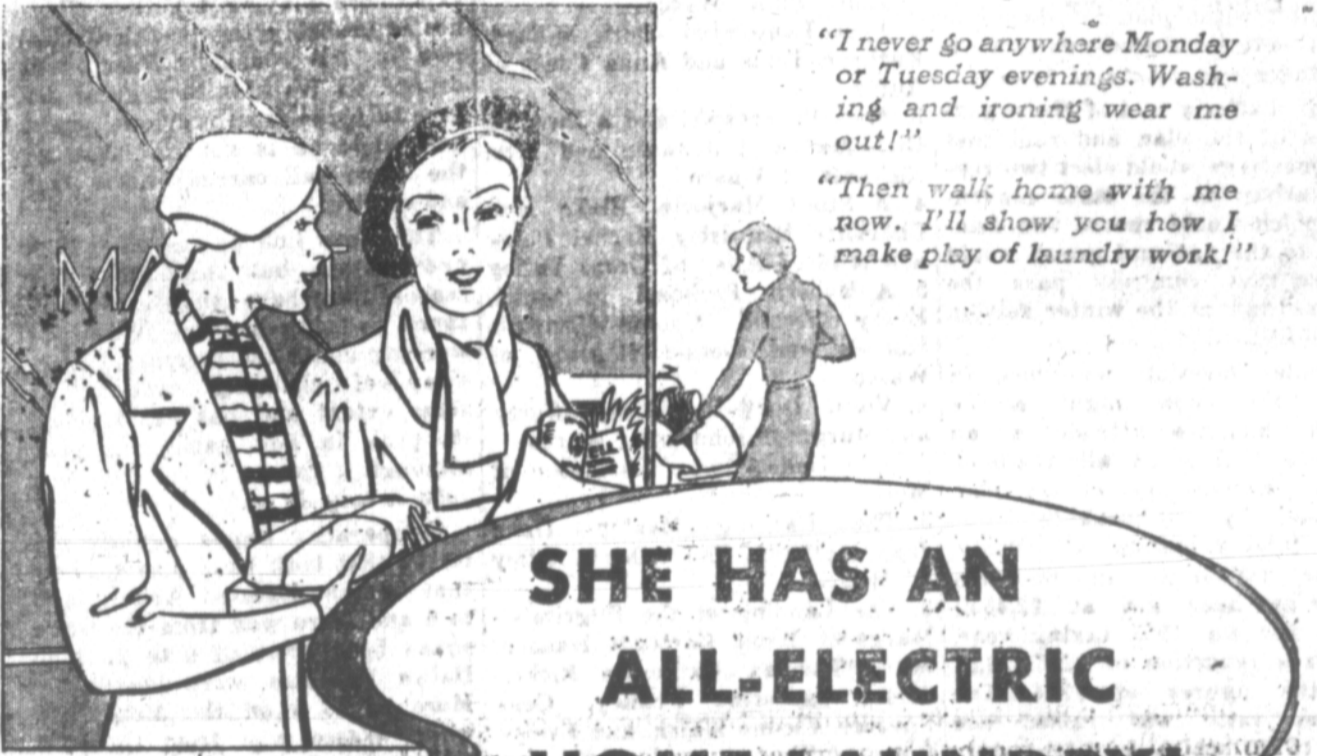
