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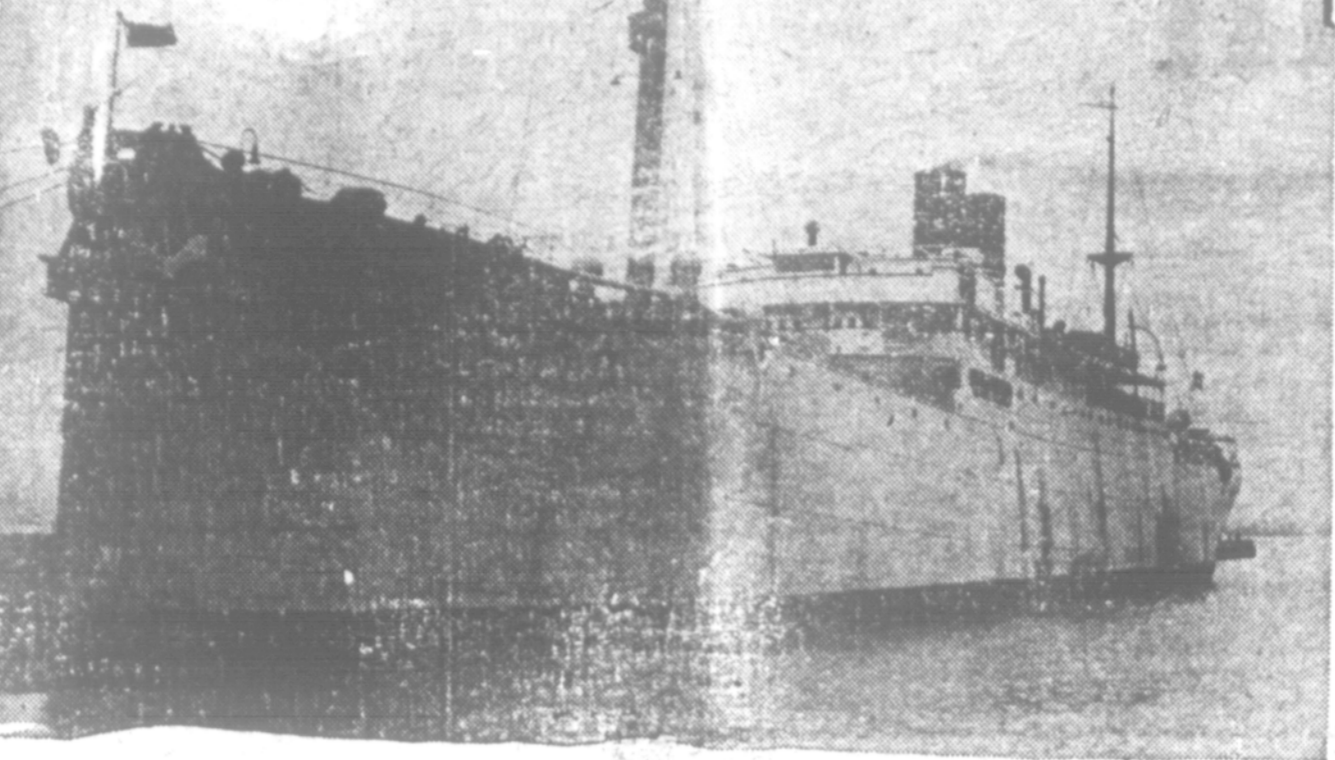

Bees as Messengers
A German beekeeper has found new use for bees. They're no longer to be mere honey-gatherers and wax-builders, but messengers. He has written messages on scraps of paper and fastened them to the backs of bees. The bees have quickly brought them back to the hive, and never has a bee failed to deliver the goods. The beekeeper says bees are less likely than pigeons to fall into the wrong hands.

Largest Meteorite
The largest meteorite in the world is the Grouffontaine, found in Southwestern Africa. It is an enormous block of metal almost rectangular in shape, 9 by 10 feet and of a thickness varying from 2 1/2 to almost 4 feet. It weighs at least 50 tons. Another large meteorite is the Greencraft meteorite that Admiral Peary brought back and placed in the American Museum of Natural History in New York. It weighs 3 1/2 tons.

Record For Auto Deaths Still High

No noticeable improvement in the automobile fatality record was made in the month of October, according to a report released by P. J. Stadelman, secretary of state, this week, which shows 33 deaths from motor vehicle accidents during the month as compared to 27 in October, 1933.

The trend of the year's record toward more fatalities and a greater number of injuries resulting from car crashes was maintained in October, although there were a few less accidents than in the same month of 1933. The report shows 1,893 accidents and 438 re-

sultant injuries in October, 1934, and 1,905 accidents and 385 injuries in October, 1933.

Ten pedestrians were killed in October. Seventeen of the fatalities involved only one motor vehicle, having been caused by a collision with a fixed object, going off the road, skidding, or other non-collision type of accident.

During the first ten months of 1934, 251 persons have been killed and 4,002 injured, in 16,786 automobile accidents. In the same period in 1933, 199 persons were killed, 3,343 injured, and 15,653 accidents occurred. The increase in deaths from motor vehicle causes is 26 per cent thus far this year.
