MARKETS REMAIN FIRM DESPITE GOOD REPORTS
Domestic wheat markets turned decidedly firmer despite more favorable weather for the domestic crop. Moderate to heavy rains were beneficial to the Mississippi Valley, where the condition of wheat is good to excellent. Additional moisture also favored growth in the eastern Great Plains, but in the Western Plains area moisture was still urgently needed. Frequent rains from the Rocky Mountains westward and in the Pacific Northwest were very beneficial, with soil conditions much improved and winter grain doing well.
The condition of winter wheat in Europe is reported generally favorable. Continued mild weather has advanced wheat too much in the Balkan and colder weather is needed, but conditions of winter sowings in the western Mediterranean Basin were reported good late in November. HI-WAYS TO HEALTH

There just couldn't be enough cookies made for the holiday season. No other one confection can be put to as many uses as cookies during this season of the year. Packed carefully and wrapped in gay colors, they make acceptable gifts. For the Christmas basket they are most appropriate and too, they answer for the informal entertaining that falls upon most of us during the holidays.
Here are a number of cookie recipes that will help fill the need for this busy season of the year.

Spice Cookies
Four cups sifted flour
One-half teaspoon soda
Two tsp phosphate B. P.
Two teaspoons cinnamon
One-half teaspoon cloves
One spoon vanilla
Two cups chopped nuts
Two pounds dates
Two cups sugar
One cup butter
Three eggs
Three tsp buttermilk

Almond Cakes
One-half cup butter
Three-fourth cup sugar
One-third cup milk
Two eggs
One one-third cup flour
Two teaspoons baking powder
One cup almonds (blanched and cut fine.)

Chocolate Cookies
One-half cup butter
One cup sugar
Two eggs
Two-thirds cup flour
Two squares chocolate
One cup walnut meats
One-fourth teaspoon salt
One-fourth tsp vanilla
Cream butter, add sugar gradually while beating constantly; add eggs well beaten, melted chocolate walnut meats chopped, salt, vanilla and sifted flour. Drop a tiny amount from tip of spoon on greased tin sheet one inch apart and bake in modern oven (375 degrees)

Date Sandwich Cookies
One-half cup butter
One cup brown sugar
One and one-fourth cups rolled oats
One-half teaspoon soda
One on-fourth cups pastry flour
One-fourth cup milk
Date paste
Cream butter until soft, add sugar and cream again until smooth. Sift flour, then measure. Resift with the soda and then combine with the rolled oats. Add the dry ingredients alternately with the milk. Divide dough in half. Roll out to about one-eighth inch in thickness. Spread with date paste. Cover with the other half of the dough that has been rolled out to the same thickness and similar

acreage equal or possibly greater than that sown in the fall of 1933. The Italian crop for the country as a whole averages good and early sowings are reported in fair condition in Spain. Winter crops in Russia are in favorable condition with snow forecast in many sections. Dryness has delayed seeding in the Punjab of India. Rains during the week interrupted harvesting in Argentina and lowered the quality in Southern districts. Continued rainy weather also delayed harvesting in Australia but the quality of early arrivals is reported excellent and a crop if around 130,000,000 bushels is now in prospect, according to trade estimates.
