HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

What does cheese mean to you as an item in your regular bill of fare and how much do you suppose you eat in the course of a year?

The "average" American, who ever that may be, is said to eat four and a half, the Dane 18, the Norwegian averages ten and three fourths, the German ten and a half, the Frenchman ten and a half, the Swiss 16 pounds, the Hollander fourteen and a fourth, the Italian 12, and the Britisher eight and a half pounds.

Cheese gives good returns for your money, for the food value is very high. It has, in concentrated form, most of the constituents of milk from which it is made (some are removed with the whey). Five ounces of cheddar cheese, for example, furnish most of the nutritive values of 1 quart of milk. Some other cheese of course, such as cottage cheese, are less concentrated.

Cheese may easily be used to furnish the main protein dish for a meal, or even for the day, for

cheese is one fourth protein. It is at the same time, like milk, an excellent source of calcium. In quantity, however, it is often best to use cheese finely flaked or grated and mixed with bread crumbs, or with other foods, making it more digestible. Also, when you must economize, a little cheese can be used not only to add flavor, but to "complete" the protein of vegetables in soups, or chowders, or stews, or scalloped dishes. Potatoes with cheese sauce; creamed cabbage with grated cheese; tomatoes and macaroni cooked with flaked cheese; rice and cheese; creamed spinach with cheese; corn, cheese and tomatoes on toast; peppers stuffed with cheese stuffing—all these are combinations that assure good protein values along with other values, including calcium and vitamin A particularly. Cheese biscuits, muffins and gingerbread, brown betty with cheese, baked apple with cheese, besides, of course, Welsh rabbit, cheese fondue, "English Monkey", creamed cheese on toast, or cheese omelet.

Cheese Souffle is the most appetizing dish and will be sure to please most every one.

Cheese Souffle
Three tablespoons butter
Three tablespoons flour
One half teaspoon salt
One and one half cups milk
Three eggs
One cup grated cheese
One cup dry bread crumbs

Melt the butter, blend in the flour and salt and add milk. When thickened, add the cheese and cook until melted. Remove from the fire and add the crumbs and beaten egg yolks. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites. Bake in buttered casserole in a 325-350 degree oven until firm to the touch.

Small Receipts Cause Price Increase

Small market receipts, threatened crop damage from severe cold in areas without snow protection delayed harvesting in Argentina were strengthening influences in the general situation. Toward the close of the week, a severe cold wave over-spread much of the domestic winter wheat belt. Recent snows provided protection in Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota and northern portions of eastern Iowa, Illinois and Indiana. In other sections of the Ohio valley and Great Plains there was little or no protection and damage to winter wheat was threatened, particularly in the Western portion of the main belt, where drought had already weakened the plant. In Europe mild weather and excessive rains have advanced the crop too rapidly in France and in the Balkan states and colder weather was urgently needed. The lightness of the snow cover in Russia was causing some apprehension for the wheat crop in that country. Rains delayed harvesting in the Argentine, but first samples from the Pampas district showed good quality. Wheat from the Santa Fe area was reported of light test weight, but the weight increased as the harvesting moved south-
