STATEHOUSE GOSSIP (Continued from page one) by Governor Meier before the latter's term was to expire, but he made his getaway just a month too soon. Now he will be out of luck. And Governor Martin made it plain he would not issue very many pardons. Meier had issued more than 135 during his four years, these in addition to regular paroles.

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Gov. Martin is also getting impatient with the Legislature, and anxious they go home. But only after they pass his desired legislation. And so far progress on that has been exceedingly halting. And in some cases there has been direct revolt. When the Legislature is over it will be seen this has not been much of a session. And still no definite relief suggestions have been made.

In the meantime the Governor says he has enjoyed his job as Chief Executive. He looks it too. He comes to his office at 9:30 every morning, works through to 1 o'clock. Then orders his cheese sandwich and glass of milk, the same every day, rests in his office until 2 o'clock, and then works until six.

In answer to a query received by your correspondent, as to the meaning of the "emergency clause," we wish to say measures carrying the clause become statutory immediately upon their signature by the Governor. Other wise Legislative acts become effective 90 days after the session adjourns. However, no taxation or revenue raising measures may carry the emergency clause, thus permitting the referendum with the 90 days.
