These friends argue that it would be no time to bring up the cabinet form of Government, but that isn't all. Threats of recall of the Governor, they fear, would be enhanced, and also that a demand for a public investigation of state relief funds would be made by the legislature.

The latter idea was advanced upon predictions the present investigation by the Governor's committee will not result in finding anything radically wrong, and little will be reported by the group which has just completed its hearings and is now in executive session preparing the report. Those demanding open probe will argue the governor and his committee had suppressed irregularities. So the pendulum swings back and forth, with the majority feeling there will be a session.

The possibility of such a session has prevented the governor from naming any more members of the legislature to state positions at this time. Should he do so, the small democratic lead in the house may be seized by republicans, giving that party full control of both

houses—the senate now being republican.

A special session would be limited to 20 days only. While the regular session was set up as 40 days, members may continue on indefinitely, but without pay. But the constitution limits extra-ordinary session to 20 days, and the meet must end at that time. The Governor, of course, could call another one immediately if the work had not been completed. There is no limit as to the number of these sessions a Governor may call.

With recall threats on all sides, one cannot help but wonder who might be governor within a short time. Townsendsites and grange are threatening recall against Martin. Portland people have said Harry Corbett, president of the senate and next in line would also be recalled. And John E. Cooter, speaker of the house, was expected to accept a federal post which would disqualify him from the legislature.
