Including recreation grounds and building sites. The part of the fair grounds south of the barns will be the building site, in all probability, and the remainder of the grounds will be used for its customary purposes and for recreation by the camp members.

It was understood from Mr. Johnson when he was in the county that some work would be done on the blow lands of the north end of the county and also that the steep lands in the northwest portion would receive attention from the conservationists.

Six Hour Day Followed  
The men will work six hours per day for five days per week or a total of thirty hours. Transportation up to half an hour each way is done on camp time making a seven or eight hour day away from camp for all workmen.

All camps established for the erosion service bear the letters SCS following the practice of the army initialing commonly used words. They stand for Soil Conservation Service and this one will be number 4 making the army designation SCS-4. The name for mailing purposes will be Camp Moro, if preliminary recommendations are followed.
