Bang's Disease Eradication Begins Manday

Condemned Cattle Will be Paid for

S. B. Foster, who will be in charge of the eradication work on Bang's disease in Sherman county will arrive Monday to begin work. Cattle of the farmers who cooperate in the project will have a blood test given their stock. This may be repeated four times if conditions seem to indicate that Bang's disease may be in the herd.

Condemned cattle will be paid for by the government with \$50 as the top price. For instance, if a cow is condemned and can be sold for beef she is sold. The owner gets the price. And in addition he will receive an indemnity equal to the appraised value and the market price provided this difference is no more than \$25 for a grade animal and \$50 for a purebred.

Contracts with the government must be signed before the veterinarian has authority to do any work on the herd. The work ends this year on December 31 and must be started immediately in order to give time for a sufficient number of tests.
