Crop Prospect Held Favorable

With crop prospects favorable, food exports small, and the population of the country estimated to be near stationary, both the immediate and the long time outlook is for a food supply equal to or above the average annual amount actually consumed in this country during the 1929-1933 five-year period, says the July summary of the agricultural situation prepared by the State College agricultural extension service.

More Food Available
"With normal crop conditions during the remainder of the 1935 season, on the basis of present prospects, it is expected that the total supply of food will be slightly more than the average amount consumed from 1929 to 1933, after allowing for probable exports and a normal carryover," says the report. Details in respect to the various food commodities are given including the fact that, in general, supplies of dairy products, fats and oils, cereals, fruits and vegetables will be somewhat larger in relation to actual consumption from 1929 to 1933, while supplies of meats, poultry and eggs, and possibly sugar are somewhat smaller.

Supplies of feed for farm animals will probably be sufficient to provide normal rations, it is indicated. The number of grain-consuming animals to be fed next winter is estimated at 15 per cent below average and may consume animals 3 or 4 per cent below average.

In respect to the trend of prices for farm products and the cost of operating the farm business, the circular shows a downward trend from April to June in the general level of prices received by farmers, with the Oregon index at mid-June at 65 per cent of the 1926-1930 level, compared with 70 in April. Farm prices in general have been steadier during recent weeks, with advances in some commodities about offsetting declines in others.

Owing to a sharp decline in prices of feeds, the general advance in the index of prices paid by farmers for commodities seems to have been checked, at least temporarily, at a point between 90 and 95 per cent of the 1926-1930 level. Interest rates and taxes are a good deal lower than during the 1926-1930 period, although the index of taxes per acre is still 89 per cent above 1913, and the actual amount of interest to be paid is large in relation to prewar conditions owing to increased indebtedness.

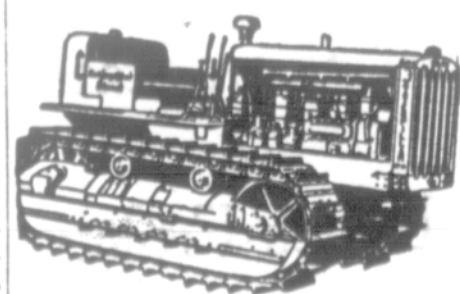

Peaches and cream! And how we have been waiting for them. Peaches are in the market now and there is no better way to serve them than sliced fresh with good cream over them. Apricots, too, are delicious served in this way and with berries still on the market there is little reason for much concern over the question of what to serve for dessert.

But if you want the dessert to have a more important place in the menu there are simple desserts with custard foundations. Made with milk and eggs and combined with colorful fruit, custards can be transformed into a variety of appetizing combinations and filled with food value.

With a generous supply of milk in the refrigerator, homemakers have the basis for innumerable tasty desserts, as well as the most important food essential for well-balanced meals. Custards, puddings, cakes, cookies, many of the fillings for pies, as well as ice cream, demand milk for a perfect product.

The homemaker seeking suitable desserts for summer days has to prepare food that will appeal to the appetites that have been wearied by the heat. Desserts should be simple and not those necessitating a long time spent over a hot

stove. Then, too, choose those that can be made in the morning, chilled in the ice box and then are ready for lunch or dinner.

Here are some recipes that are delicious combined with fresh fruit:

Baked Custard With Fresh Peaches

- Four cups scalded milk
- Four eggs or 6 egg yolks
- One-half cup sugar
- One teaspoon vanilla
- One-fourth tsp nutmeg
- One-fourth tsp salt

To eggs which have been blended with a fork add sugar and salt. Stir constantly while adding slowly the hot milk, then the vanilla. Pour mixture into buttered custard cups or baking dish. Sprinkle with nutmeg. Set in a pan of hot water and bake in a slow oven 30 to 40 minutes. This recipe serves eight. After custards have been cooked and thoroughly cooled, turn out into sherbet dishes and arrange slices of peaches around them. These may be served with or without whipped cream.

Fruit Tapioca Cream

- Two cups milk
- One egg
- One cup sugar
- Two tsp minute tapioca
- One-eighth tsp salt
- Two tsp lemon juice
- One half cup chopped fruit

Scald milk, add tapioca, and cook until tapioca is transparent; add slightly beaten yolk of egg, sugar, and salt, and cook until thick. Add lemon juice. Beat egg white until stiff. Fold into hot mixture. Add chopped fresh fruit. Chill thoroughly.
