Farmers Are Keeping Better Records

More Oregon farmers can tell you accurately this year what the cost of a crop is in comparison to returns than have ever been able to do it before. The reason is that more farm records are being kept this year in practically every Oregon county than at any time in the past, records of the extension agricultural economics section at OSC show.

Approximately 1500 copies of the Oregon farm record book were distributed during the 12 months ending June 30. In addition hundreds of AAA farm record books are in use, especially in localities where large numbers of wheat and corn-hog contracts were signed by farmers.

Encouragement and training in record keeping given by county agents, Smith-Hughes teachers and agricultural committees of farm and bank organizations are factors in the increased activity in this field. The Farm Credit administration and the AAA have emphasized the importance of more and better farm records.

Grass Fire Adds To Convention Decorations

The Dalles, Oregon, August 1.—Big Chief "Burn-in-the-Face" will be a prominent guest at the American Legion convention here August 14, 15, 16 and 17.

A grass fire which raged over 3000 acres of pasture land on Seven Mile hill to the west of the city, burned itself out against the west wind in such a manner that an immense profile of an Indian face was outlined on the hill side, plainly visible from the city.

Legionnaires are declaring that the picture is that of the "Spirit of the West Wind," always depended upon to keep the city cool during the summer months.
