"Watch your speed and keep your mind on your driving," said the motor club president. "Remember that the highways will be crowded, and that experience has proved driving more hazardous under this condition. An accident on the highway is three times as dangerous as a mishap on a city street."

Dr. McDaniel stressed the importance of sportsmanship in driving—observing the "other fellow's" rights—and the importance of keeping the other fellow constantly in mind.

"The old courtesy of the road should not be forgotten," he said. "It is a rule that will save more lives than any other. It is something that our legislators can not write in the statutes, but it is a law that should not be ignored."

The motorist official said his organization's touring department and branch offices throughout the state have been rushed during the past few days answering inquiries about mountain and beach resorts. Along with touring information, the staff members have been instructed to give sound advice on safe driving.
