Approximately 95 percent of the state's allotment will be available to farms on which potatoes were grown in the 1932-34 base period, while the remainder is reserved for new producers or other ineligible for an ordinary allotment. Approximately 64 million farms in the United States reported potato production in 1929, but only about one-fourth of these grew potatoes commercially. The new program is to be concerned primarily with those who grow potatoes for sale.
