(Continued from page one) self, to enable you to see through quackery, and to determine the truth.

The new lower division advisory system installed at the university this year, which has already attracted the attention of educators throughout the country, was described by Dr. Boyer. The most important factor in this is the service given by the 24 carefully selected freshman advisors, he pointed out. "These men have a keen understanding of your problems. You can go to them with your problems, concerning your studies. Should you fall in love you can even go to them, for they realize how such a condition can temporarily relegate such things as studies to the background—and perhaps they will help you work things out so you can keep up in your classwork as well.

While the university offers an opportunity for self advancement, it also imposes a responsibility. Dr. Boyer pointed out. "The passing from prosperity into depression means that there is something wrong with political theory, economic practice and social adjustment," he declared. "You must now use your mind to lead us out of the present morass and to the establishment of the good life for all."
