After the car lost traction it careened and skidded for about a hundred yards, turned completely over for at least once and came to a stop in an upright position. It has the front top broken in, the radiator pushed back, one door broken, but only one window shattered. The car was loaded onto an Eastern Oregon freight truck and taken to The Dalles.

The accident happened only a few minutes before Art Fetter appeared on the scene, Keith McDonald, mail carrier, had passed along just ten minutes before, and he saw no sign of the wreck.

It is reported Mr. Fuller's car was fully insured.
