RUFUS SCHOOL

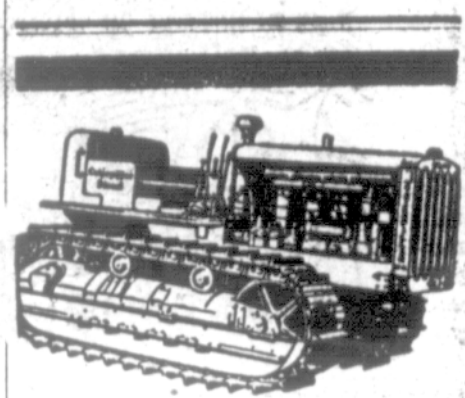

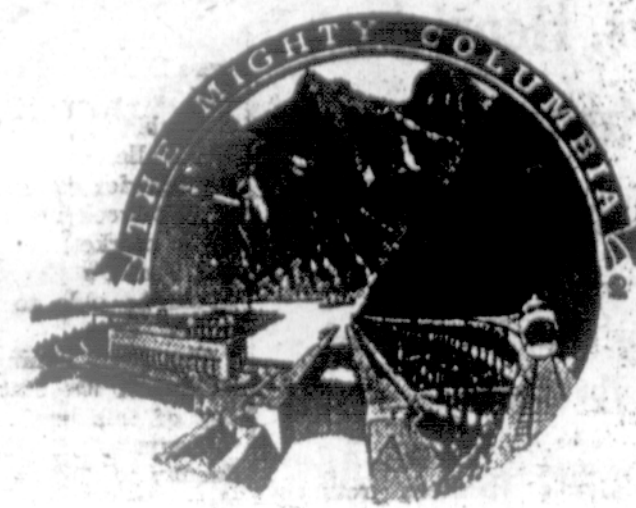
