Mule Deer Saved By CCC Youths In Lake County

One mule deer in the Freemont national forest near Lakeview, Oregon, is in Thanksgiving mood due to the Good Samaritan deed of CCC boys from Gog Lake Forest Service camp.

On their way to work one morning recently the boys saw what looked like a deer lying helpless on the ice of Drews reservoir about a half a mile from shore. Returning with a boat after the days work they partly chopped and partly shoveled their way over the ice to the maimed animal which turned out to be a doe that had been unable to get up. First aid was administered in front of the mule deer, as soon as the doe could be hauled into the boat and brought ashore. After about 15 minutes of warming and massaging the frightened animal was able to get on her feet and soon bounded off into the woods apparently none the worse for her experience.

The mule deer is a wood frequently used in Southwestern Oregon, where it has been generally credited with around 20 years of life.

Charred Douglas Fir posts continue to fall about as fast as fir posts untreated. Alder without treatment were the first posts to go out entirely under the 60-pound pull to which all of the posts in the test plot are subjected annually.

All but one of the cottonwoods have failed, although cottonwood posts treated with creosote by the simple open tank method have shown no failures.

Douglas fir posts treated with corrosive sublimate by placing small amounts of the chemical in one or more holes bored near the base of the post are standing up well. Directions for applying this treatment may be had free upon application to the school of forestry.

World's Oldest Locomotive Railroad Viaduct



At Relay, Md., stands a viaduct that has rendered one hundred years of steady daily service carrying the heaviest trains. It is the Thomas viaduct of the Baltimore and Ohio line, the oldest of its kind in the world, spanning the Patapsco river outside of Baltimore. The 103-year-old Atlantic locomotive and trolley coaches in use in the 1830s are here contrasted with the new streamlined train—the Royal Blue—that began using the bridge the other day on the Washington-New York route.

Treating Fence Posts Not Always A Successful Scheme

The eighth year of observation and testing on a "post farm" of various woods used in fencing has been made by the school of forestry at Oregon State college, confirming earlier results as to good and bad types for treatment for posts.

The most surprising new development is the failure of six out of 25 incense cedar posts in only six years. While this is not the western red cedar more commonly used in fencing, it is a wood frequently used in Southwestern Oregon.

Milk for Children

Men show a decided preference for pie as a Thanksgiving dessert. The pumpkin chifon pie suggested is particularly desirable not only because it is delicious; it has the added advantage of being as light a dessert as you can serve. And the fact that you put the filling into a baked shell is in its favor. There is no danger here of soggy lower crust and the shell can be prepared a day or two in advance.

Pumpkin Chifon Pie

Cook together in double boiler until thickened 1 cup brown sugar; 3 eggs yolks (beaten slightly); One and a half cooked pumpkin one-half cup milk; 2 tsp cinnamon; one-half tsp ginger; One-fourth tsp allspice and one-half tsp salt. Then soak 2 tsp gelatin in one-fourth cup cold water and add to the above mixture. When it begins to cool fold in the 3 egg whites beaten stiff and 2 tsp of sugar. Put all into baked pie shell and serve with whipped cream.

Oyster Dressing

1 large (15c) loaf of bread 2 cups or cans of oysters 1-2 cup of butter 1 1/2 cups milk warmed Seasoned with salt, pepper & sage 2 eggs well beaten Break bread into small pieces. Season and add liquids. Add oysters just before using.

continue much as it has in the past," said Duffy. Judge Bryan will assist in correlating the work of county committees in the state, and with the aid of local supervisors will direct necessary debt adjustments for rehabilitation clients.

L. R. Breithaupt, extension economist, Oregon State college, has been loaned to the resettlement administration to take charge of debt adjustment work for region 11, embracing Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Carried on under the Governor's agricultural advisory council, debt adjustment work in Oregon is credited with saving hundreds of farms from fore closure and keeping many farm families off relief rolls through adjustments between debtors and creditors.

A national allocation of \$2,000,000 from Works Relief Funds has been made for "out-of-pocket" expenditures of local and state committees, and necessary supervisory service.
