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Land Bank Has Hopes For Agriculture

Commissioner Goss Makes Many Farm Loans

Bringing an optimistic report on the improvement of agricultural conditions, Land Bank Commissioner F. W. Peck of the Farm Credit administration at Washington D. C., concluded a brief tour through the northwest this week by attending the monthly meeting of the 12th district farm credit council, or directing board which governs the Land Bank. Intermediate Credit bank, Production Credit corporation and Bank for Cooperatives at Spokane.

Goss Busy

As Land Bank commissioner, Mr. Goss has been in charge of one of the most herculean services during the past two and one half years ever performed for American agriculture, the sound refinancing of mortgage indebtedness of almost three quarters of a million farmers who were being pressed by other creditors and threatened with the loss of their homes through foreclosure.

"There are many indications that the emergency phase of the problem has been largely met," he told the board, "with distress appeals declining to only a half

dozen a day as compared with a peak of more than half a thousand a day during the depth of the depression. Our efforts are now being turned toward perfecting our operations, eliminating delays, developing economies and establishing a system which will serve the credit needs of agriculture adequately on a sound cooperative basis and assist farmers to work their way out of debt.

Loan As's Active

"Most of this money has been loaned through national farm loan associations. There are almost 5000 of these cooperative mortgage loan associations scattered throughout the country. They are owned and operated by the farmers who have borrowed through them. The associations endorse the notes of their members, and in effect, discount these notes through the Land Bank.

"It is our plan to develop these local associations into servicing organizations so that the collections of installments and the caring for real estate will be largely done through their hands. This is part of the general program of decentralization under which we hope to get the administration out as close to the farm as possible."

Before being appointed Land bank commissioner, Mr. Goss was master of the Washington State Grange and director-at-large of the Land Bank at Spokane.

W. F. Peck, cooperative bank commissioner, who has been visiting a number of northwest cooperative associations, reported finding an optimistic feeling and spirit of forward planning among the groups he contacted. He foresees a steady growth of the already well developed cooperative activity in this area and predicted that the

Spokane Bank for Cooperatives will steadily grow in size and breadth of service along with the cooperative movement.

Government Loaning

Characterizing the present state of cooperative activity as the "management stage", Commissioner Peck admonished the co-operatives to employ good management and sound business practices, pay careful attention to membership relation problems, stand on their own feet and avoid government paternalism. He also notes with approval the tendency for cooperatives to cooperate more with one another for beneficial results to their members.

"It is becoming more and more realized that there is no panacea in cooperation and that cooperatives must operate on hard facts and not fancy or imagination," he declared. "But conducted in a sound businesslike way, cooperation offers an opportunity for the individual, by uniting with others, to serve his own interests better than he could by acting alone."

The two commissioners returned to Washington Wednesday.
