A great variety of individual attractive gifts for the holiday season may be made in the kitchen. Of all the possibilities, home made candies ingeniously packed and wrapped are universally the most popular of all.

As you get the candy ready to pack, keep in mind that candied orange peel or grapefruit peel offers contrast and color. Moreover, they are economical and easily made.

Approach your candy making with a determination to work carefully and accurately. Always stir the ingredients sufficiently to dissolve the sugar before cooking. If possible use a candy thermometer to avoid guess work. If it is a candy that must be beaten, wait until it is completely cold before beating and beat until it holds its shape. Take your time; be patient; you can't hurry the process and be successful.

You will find the recipes listed easy to make and suggestive of Christmas.

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Continue beating until it holds its shape. Pour onto buttered plate and cut in squares.

Butter Cream Caramels
2 cups granulated sugar
2 cups light colored corn syrup
2 cups cream
1 tsp. vanilla

Put the sugar, salt and corn syrup into heavy sauce pan, that will hold at least two quarts. Stir constantly and cook rapidly to 245 degrees or to the hard ball stage. Add the butter and cream so gradually that the mixture does not stop boiling at any time. Continue cooking with constant stirring to 242 F. Besides constant stirring it is necessary to do very thorough stirring all over the bottom of the pan at the last of the cooking. Add flavoring as soon as the candy is removed from fire and pour at once into well buttered pans. Cool thoroughly before cutting. Caramels should be cut into cubes about 1x1x1 inches. Wrap neatly in heavy paraffin paper. Yield: 2 lb. Requires about 20 minutes to make these.

Butterscotch
1 cup sugar
4 tbsp molasses
1 tbsp vinegar
2 tbsn boiling water
1-2 cup butter

Stir the ingredients together and cook without stirring to the hard crack stage. This means that when the syrup is dropped in cold water it breaks between the fingers if you try to crush it. Turn into a large buttered tin, making a thin layer. When partly cool, mark in squares, or when cold break in pieces with the handle of a knife. Nut meats may be added.

2 cups sugar
1 cup hot milk
2 tbsp butter
1 cup walnuts

Melt one cup sugar until caramelized. The ideal caramel is amber-colored. As soon as the sugar is liquified add 1 cup rich hot milk and one cup sugar with a pinch of salt. Cook it to soft ball stage, stirring constantly. Remove from fire, add butter, cool and beat until creamed. Add 1 cup walnuts.

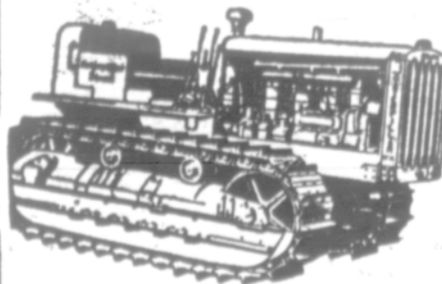

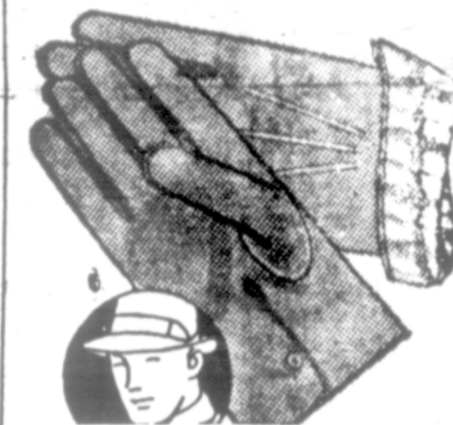
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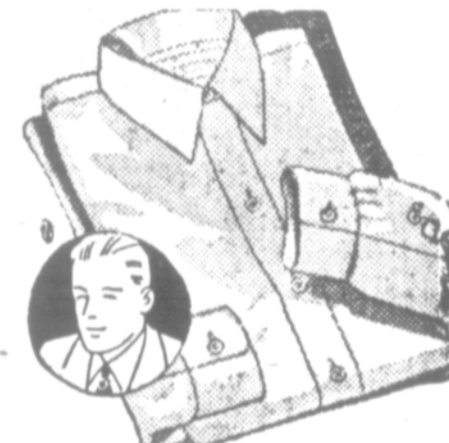
