Members of the mother's club held their regular annual meeting Monday evening at the home of Mrs. Claude Eaton.

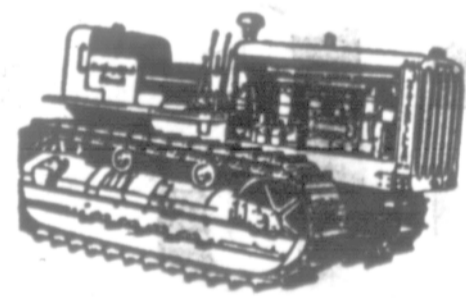
Essie Herring was hostess to friends at six tables of Bunko recently. Beryl Sheets and Steven O'Meara won high scores.

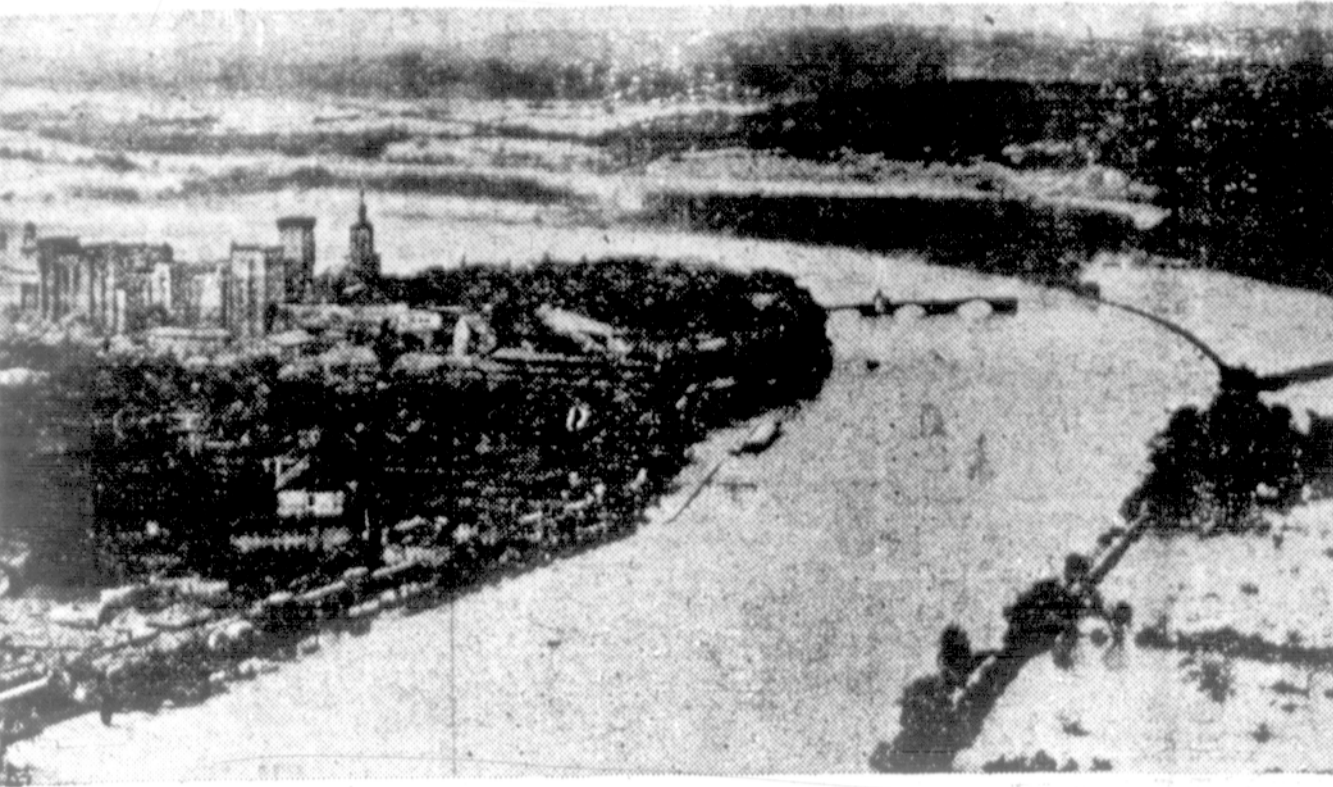

Russian Crop Good

Russia harvested a good crop and steady offers of good Russian have been a feature in the market situation this season, in contrast to negligible offerings a year ago. Harvests in European importing countries, although below those of the past three years, were generally above any previous harvest prior to 1932. Stocks of local wheat however, on January 1, were substantially smaller than a year earlier.

1-4 tsp dry or prepared mustard

Melt the cheese in a pan with the butter. Add cream to the egg well beaten and fold into the melted cheese. Add the Worcestershire sauce and serve over fresh crackers or strips of crisp toast. Serves 6 or 8

Hard to digest? Oh, my no! But do be careful how you cook it. Because cheese contains so much protein, it should be cooked at a very low temperature. In fact, most dishes should be cooked over water, or in a very slow oven. For the main dish try:

5 eggs
1 7-8 cup soft bread crumbs
1 1/2 cups milk
3-4 tsp salt

Wheat Situation Stronger Than Year Ago

16,500,000 Bushels Of Wheat Imported Into The U.S. Since July

The general wheat situation at the first of January, was materially stronger than a year ago. World stocks were substantially smaller, particularly in the important importing countries. Supplies in the United States were generally adequate for local needs with the exception of Hard Red Spring wheat, for which this country is on an import basis. During the period July through November, over 12,000,000 bushels, mostly Canadian wheat, were imported for milling purposes. About 4,500,000 bushels additional were imported into this country during this period for feed. Canadian stocks available for export or carryover at the first of January were around 20,000,000 bushels smaller than a year earlier but were still relatively large and provided the principal source for European import this season. Southern Hemisphere supplies, according to official estimates, are around 115,000,000 bushels under those of a year ago, with trade advices indicating further reduction as a result of crop damage since official estimates were made. Supplies afloat on ocean passage at the first of January totaled around 21,000,000 bushels but were only slightly lower than post-war record at this date in 1933.
