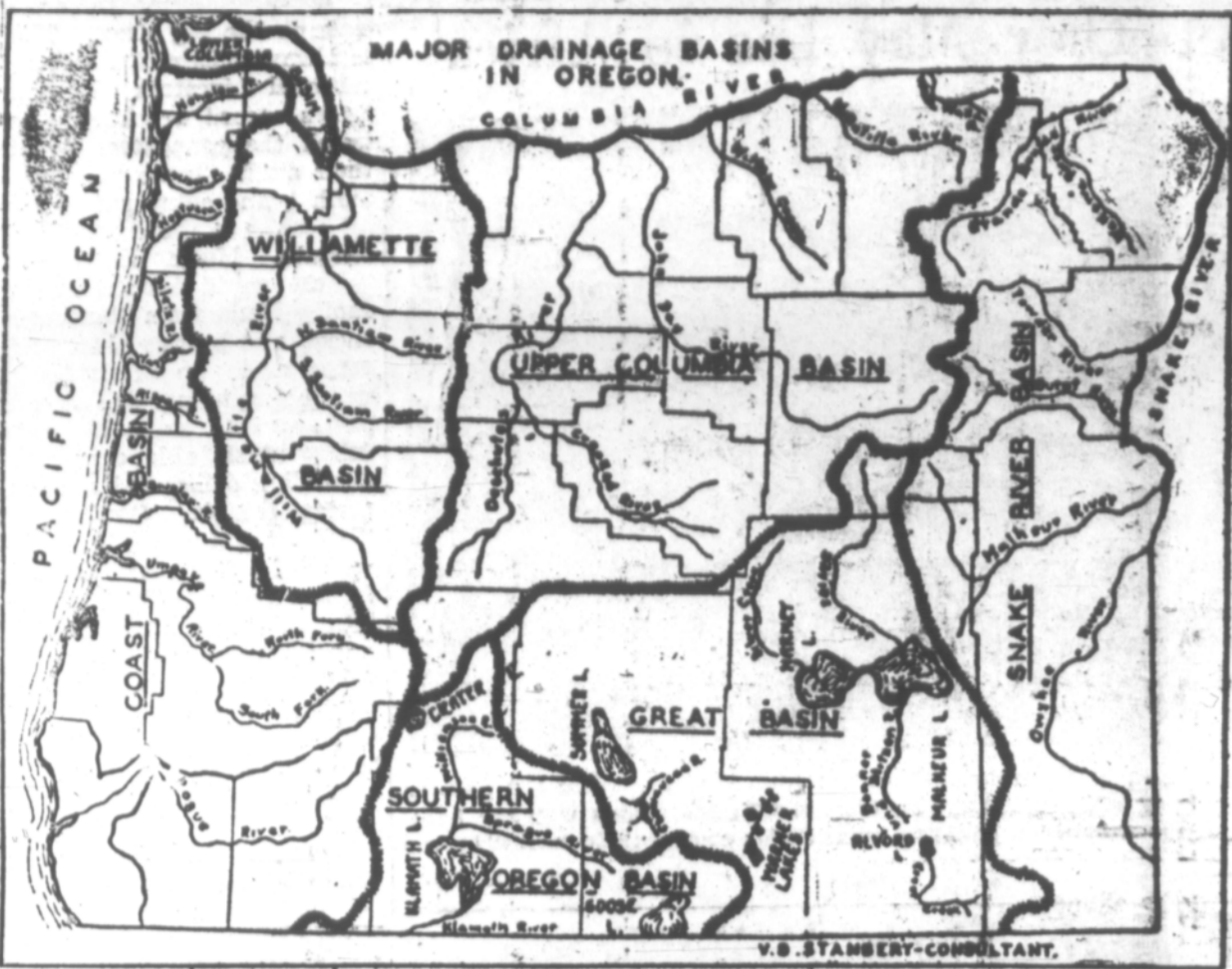

One Instructor For Adult Education

One teacher is now teaching in Sherman county on the state wide adult and nursery school education project sponsored under the WPA by the State Department of Education, according to an announcement by C. A. Howard, State Superintendent of Public Instruction. This teacher is Mrs. Mary E. Hicks.

In the state at large there are approximately 300 teachers instructing some 800 adult classes and conducting 19 nursery schools for children ages two to five from relief families. These teachers were selected from among those eligible for WPA work by city and county superintendents who have charge of the organization of the project and the supervision of the program in their districts.

A variety of adult classes are being taught this year including Americanization classes for the foreign born, public speaking, economics, first aid, crafts, parent education, commercial law, English, hobbies, cooking, sewing, recreation, literature, social problems, aviation ground school course, radio, and similar classes.

This state wide educational project is designed to give persons qualified to teach under WPA an opportunity for employment in line with their training. Americanization classes, general adult and vocational classes, and nursery schools make up the chief phases of the program.

This WPA project is supervised under the direction of C. A. Howard, Superintendent of Public Instruction. Roben J. Maaske is the State Director of Adult Education and Parent Education, and Kenneth Beach, State Supervisor of Adult Education.

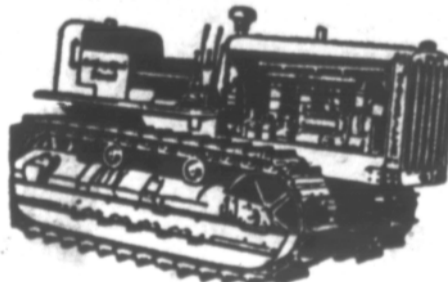
