Grain Markets But Little In Past Week

Domestic grain markets were rather quiet during the week ending January 24, with prices fluctuating within narrow ranges, according to the Weekly Grain Market Review of the United States Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Severe weather throughout the Central West sharply reduced country marketings and market receipts fell off materially. Demand remained dull for wheat, but inquiry for feed grains was stimulated somewhat by the cold snow which increased feeding needs. Rye was in good demand from mills and prices of cash grain advanced slightly. Flax, on the other hand, declined 1c to 2c per bushel, influenced by weakness in the oil market which tended to slacken crusher interest in seed.

The general wheat situation turned slightly weaker toward the close of the week, with foreign markets influenced by large new wheat shipments from Australia and liberal offerings from Canada. Light Argentine shipments, however, and uncertain Northern Hemisphere new crop prospects, tended to support prices. Clearances from Australia were unusually heavy for this time of year and totaled 3,845,000 bushels. Argentine shipments, on the other hand, were at a record low and totaled only 436,000 bushels, making a total of slightly less than 3,000,000 bushels since the first of January, compared with nearly 15,000,000 bushels shipped during the corresponding period last year.
