The return game at Rufus will be played Monday night, February 17, and the postponed game with Grass Valley at Moro will be played Tuesday the 25th of February. The other postponed games are yet to be scheduled.

Friday morning at 9 o'clock the students of Moro Public Schools will see an educational motion picture in the gymnasium if they wish to submit a dime for that purpose. Most of the students will rather go to the show, even if it is "educational," than sit in study hall and go through the torture of hearing how good the show was from the other students afterwards.

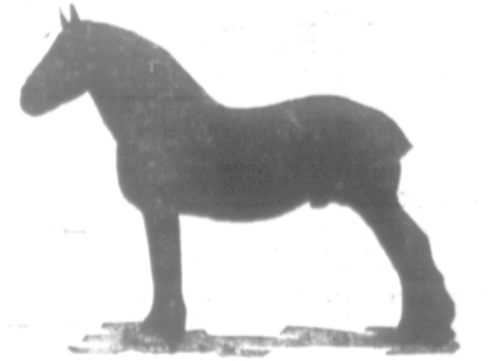

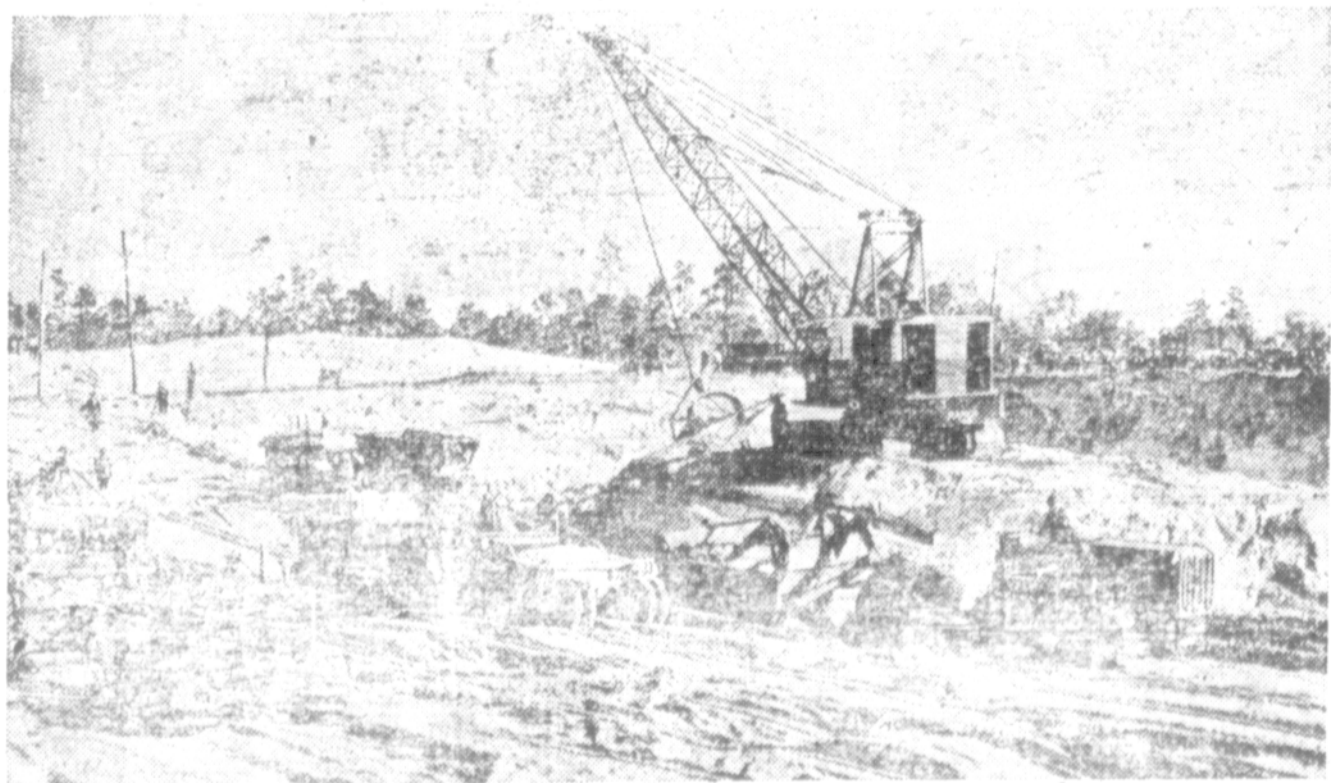
