Judge George Potter was in Portland on business Monday.

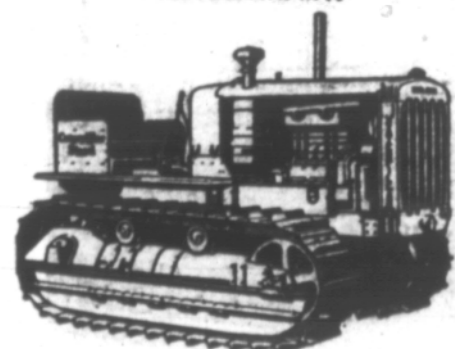
Ed Feldman is now driving a new Buick sedan having succumbed to the fever at last.

Junior meteorologist, \$2,000 a year, Bureau of Agricultural Economics, Department of Agriculture. Optional subjects are: (1) Climatology, and (2) Physical and dynamic meteorology.

All states except Colorado, Iowa, Maryland, Nebraska, South Dakota, Vermont, Virginia, and the District of Columbia have received less than their quota of appointments in the apportioned departmental service in Washington, D. C.
