"Are Sin, Disease, and Death Real?" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 12.

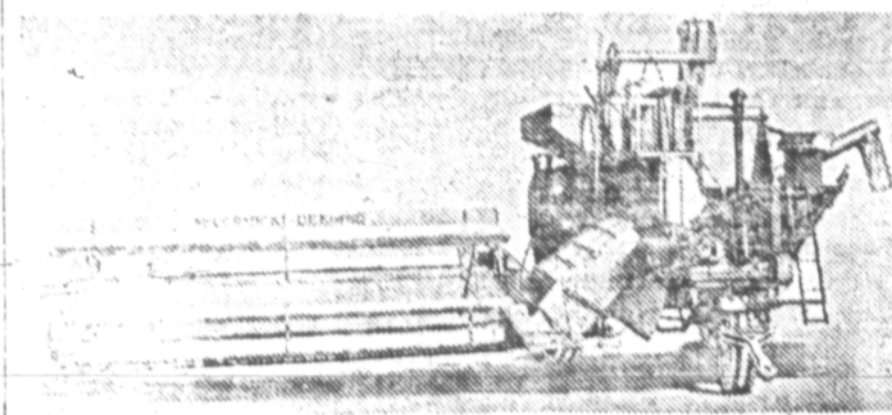
The Golden Text is, "All flesh shall see the salvation of God," (Luke 3:6.)
