APPLES DE LUXE

9 medium apples
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons butter
1 teaspoon cinnamon
Pare, quarter and core the apples. Place in a saucepan and add the sugar. Place the pan over medium heat and chop and stir the apples with a round cutter (1 pound baking powder can). When the apples are coarsely chopped, add the butter and stir with a wooden spoon. When barely cooked tender, add the cinnamon and remove from the stove. Serve either warm or cold with whipped cream.
Serves 4 to 6.

Stock Men In Danger From Game Preserves

J. N. Darling Held Wrong In Attitude Toward Public Land

Corvallis—Unified action on the part of western live stock men to meet three vital pending issues was urged by Mac Hoke of Pendleton, prominent wheat and livestock producer, in an address at the annual agricultural club banquet at Oregon State college last week end.

Hoke, who is chairman of the state board of agriculture and past president of the Eastern Oregon Wheat League, told more than 400 agricultural leaders, students and faculty in the school here that the danger from far eastern and middle western ignorance of far western conditions is acute.

Three threats against the continuation of range livestock industry were pointed out by the speaker. First is the uncertainty in connection with the new soil conservation act which as it now stands, he said, appears to encourage an increase in the livestock business in the middle west and south without any compensating program for the far western range operators. Second, he said, is the attitude of the National Cooperative council, which is advocating that Congress regulate the livestock numbers in the United States by manipulation of public lands grazing permits in the far west.

Finally, there is the almost unbelievable position recently taken by J. N. Darling, former chief of the biological survey, that practically the entire western range livestock industry should be wiped out through denial of public grazing permits in the interest of wild life and soil conservation, he pointed out.

Hoke charged that these attitudes are the result of ignorance of far western conditions, but that they will have to be met vigorously. He said the livestock men favor the Taylor Grazing act, as they have always, as an industry, been in favor of intelligently regulated use of the national forests and other public domain. Oregon is the first state to complete a work-

ing organization under the Taylor act.

Among prominent officials who heard the address was Rufus Holman, state treasurer, who represented Governor Martin, and Dr. W. J. Kerr, chancellor emeritus of higher education, who was a special guest of honor for the occasion.

Bonneville Survey Appropriation Asked

A strong recommendation that congress appropriate at this session \$250,000 to finance five surveys on market possibilities of Bonneville powers was forwarded today by Governor Martin to President Roosevelt, Oregon's congressional delegation and others in Washington D. C., it was announced by Ormand R. Bean, chairman of the Oregon state planning board.

The five surveys, covering investigation of mineral deposits, possibilities of establishing heavy industries, interconnection with other power systems, use of electricity for pumping in irrigation and drainage, and use of electricity for highway lighting, were all recommended by the advisory power committee of the planning board in a report issued recently.

State Building Report Wanted

Condition, type, location, present use, existing hazards and other details of every state-owned building in Oregon will be included in an inventory now under way under the direction of the Oregon State Planning board, it was announced by Ormand R. Bean, Portland, chairman of the planning group.

The completed report will be ready to present to Governor Martin and other state officials in the near future. It is reported by George C. Hogg, engineer of Portland, who has been placed in charge of the project. Labor for detail work is provided under a WPA grant.

A thrifty 79-year old stand of Douglas fir on the Willamette National Forest in Oregon is growing at the rate of 807 to 882 board feet, log scale, per year according to measurements made periodically by the Pacific Northwest Forest Experiment Station.
