Skin-Game For Youngsters Is Exposed at BBB

Culling their victims from among gullible and dotting parents and from high school publications listing the activities of members of dramatic societies, a number of racket "schools of coaching" have again sprung up in Hollywood and are charging fees on representation they will put children in the movies, promising quick riches and soft jobs for the parents, the Portland Better Business Bureau reports.

The names of youngsters now prominent on the screen are freely quoted. Some "schools of acting" claim they "discovered" certain child stars. Tricky contracts, fast talk, lure of the movies, flattery, and fake references are often employed to obtain advance fees, "registration costs," fees for screen tests, voice tests or for "coaching and publicity."

A drive on these schemes is being sponsored by Better Business Bureaus, the Board of Education of Los Angeles, legitimate child training schools, public officials and the Association of Motion Picture Producers. One individual has advertised that he would "like to bring two or three outstanding children to attention of film producers. Send photos." Persons responding are asked to send \$10 with photo to cover cost of engraving and printing in "mug book" which is sent unsolicited to motion picture studios.
