Mrs. O. E. Ekstrom has been visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Hennagin for several days, coming from Portland.

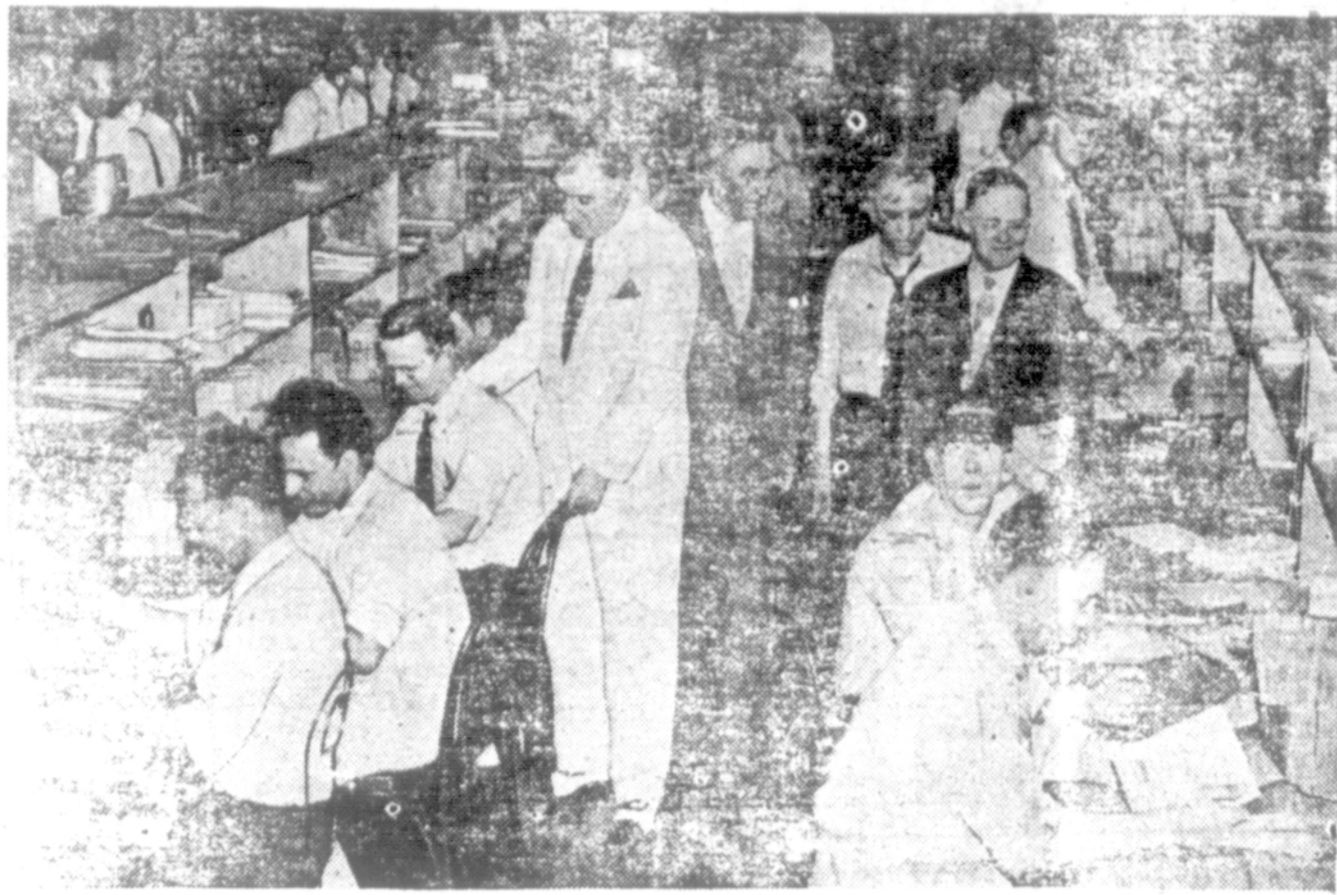
Lyle Nahouse is at work at the Pinkerton farm and Carl Peetz is working for Clarence Sparling.

Safest Driver Sought By O. S. M. A.

A search for Oregon's safest driver to participate in the first nation wide, all-expenses-paid Motorcade to New York City late in August has been announced by the Oregon State Motor association.

The Motorcade, sponsored nationally by the American Automobile Association and the C. I. T. safety foundation will be the trek of our "safest driver" from each state in the Union to New York, where a two day conference on methods of reducing traffic accidents will be held.

Application blanks for Oregon motorists have been made available by the motor club, and persons believing themselves eligible have been invited to enter the competition. These blanks may be obtained from the Oregon State Motor association headquarters in Portland or from any branch office.

Applications will be mailed to the C. I. T. Safety foundation, No. 1 Park avenue, New York, not later than July 15, the motor club point ed out. After being assorted, they will be returned to Oregon where a board of impartial judges will choose one delegate and one alternate.

Only those motorists who satisfy the following regulations will be eligible:

1. He (or she) has driven a private passenger motor vehicle for the last ten years and is still an active driver.
2. He has driven a private passenger motor vehicle at least 50,000 miles in the last ten years.
3. He has had no accidents in the last ten years.
4. He has not been convicted for violating any traffic law in the last ten years.
