LICENSE PLATES WILL BE BLACK IN 1937
Oregon's 1937 automobile license plates will be black with white letters and numerals. Contract for 280,000 sets of the plates was let this week to the Irwin-Hodson company of Portland at 8.47 cents a pair, slightly under the cost of the 1936 plates. In addition to the plates for passenger cars the state department also ordered 19,500 pairs of truck plates and 10,000 pairs of plates for light delivery cars.

Wheat Crop Shows Further Deterioration

Despite the slight recession in domestic and Canadian markets, the general wheat situation remained firm during the week under review with further serious deterioration in the spring crop. Continuous high temperatures with little or no rainfall in important growing sections cut further the domestic spring wheat crop. Deterioration was rapid throughout most of the belt although the crop held up fairly well in a few small areas. Record scorching heat with no general rains has damaged large areas of Canadian wheat beyond recovery, according to the Winnipeg Free Press. The most seriously affected areas are southern and southwestern Manitoba, southern western and northwestern Saskatchewan, and southern central and eastern Alberta. Practically no district in western Canada reports a heavy stand with sufficient moisture to carry the crop to maturity. Fairly good conditions still prevailed at the close of the week in central and northwestern Manitoba east central and northeastern Saskatchewan and Peace River area in Alberta. Russian spring wheat has also suffered from heat and drought with serious damage reported in western Provinces.

Europe Little Changed

Little change has occurred in the European situation. Germany reports a harvest of 180,000,000 bushels compared with 171,500,000 bushels last year but this increase will be partially offset by reduced carryover stocks. Local storm damage is reported in Poland and harvest has been delayed by unfavorable weather in some sections of southern Europe. Italian yields are reported below early expectations but harvesting in the lower Danubian countries is progressing under unfavorable conditions with outlooks above earlier estimates now in prospect. Southern Hemisphere crops are reported developing favorably with increased acreage indicated both in Argentina and Australia. The Australian acreage is now placed at 12,400,000 acres or about 600,000 acres above last year's seedings. Conditions are generally favorable with moisture supplies adequate. Argentine seedings has been considerably delayed by excessive moisture.
