cheaper grade could be made to the Free bridge. At the steep head of this canyon was a large spring from where he hauled water in a barrel for his house use. He pointed out to me the feasibility of this route on which an even grade could be made through loose rocks and gravel dirt. By skirting the large hillside, crossing the shallow ravines jutting therefrom was an ideal route where no great storms could result in a washout because of the shallow ravines that would carry the water across the road bed. I collected mentally all these good points and even made some notes on the horn of the saddle as I meditated over the proposition enroute on my week end visits. I then began talking the road building to Dalles merchants who had been defeated in the benefits of the Free bridge trade by Sherman county having leased their end of the road to private parties. I found a favorable sentiment among them for a return of the Free bridge Sherman county trade. Accordingly a petition was drawn up to be circulated for their subscriptions toward building the road. It fell to my lot to circulate this petition and not being familiar with The Dalles business men I sought the Chronicle editor, Fred Wilson, who is now Judge Fred Wilson, for acquaintanceship and introduction through the public press. He very accommodatingly gave the notice of my petition circulating and explained from my notes the salient points of the enterprise. I was met with good will in circulating the petition. Each business man would calculate his business proportions and willingly subscribe. Not only was I met with good will by all, but the usual hospitality of the Saloonkeepers offered their usual treats. Being a teetotaler I was unable to accept this offering. I could only assure them that not all Sherman county farmers were teetotalers.

This accomplished, the next in order was to present the case to the Sherman County Commissioners, assuring them the road would be built without more than the surveying cost to the county. The road was granted and Ed Sharp of Wasco county instructed to locate the survey. I was duly appointed one of the Viewers and the survey proved the route to be all we had anticipated from observation. It seems that nature designed this road route. At one place, and in the right place, was found a level piece of ground that permitted a turntable, as it were, where the reverse direction could be made by teams, permitting a return of the grade directly under the previous survey, allowing the road bed to be lengthened and the grade percent to be lessened. Survey completed the next in order was the collecting and disbursing of the subscription by legal authority. To A. D. McDonald and myself was delegated this authority. We were now ready for the building of the road which will be taken up in another article.

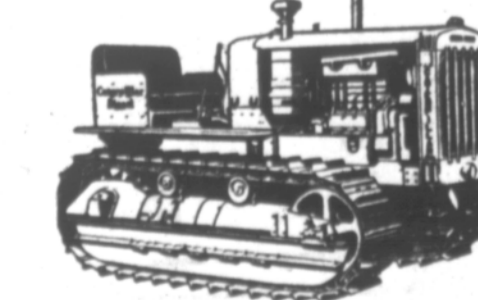
