Busy on 335 Acres of Glass



THE workman above is only one of an army of employees whose sole job is to keep clean the 335 acres of window glass in the Rouge plant of the Ford Motor Company at Dearborn, Michigan. Adequate illumination, engineers find, is important both as an efficiency and as a safety factor; so dirty windows are not tolerated. In the roof of

the new cold steel finishing mill (shown above) which is specially constructed to catch light from every angle; there are nearly two and one-half acres of window sash. More than a mile and a half of walk-ways have been constructed along the roof supports in this building to make every inch of glass easily accessible for washing.

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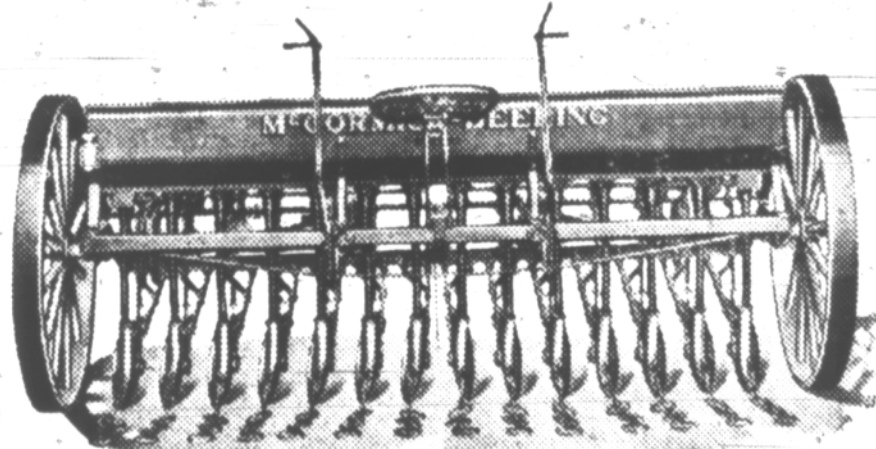
