HI-WAYS TO HEALTH

In this hysterical age with its dependency upon the can opener and the corner delicatessen, I wonder how many families have a cookie jar. And more than that, I wonder how many cookie jars are kept filled with spicy homemade cookies so popular with children and adults alike.

Educators are calling our attention to the fact that the modern child is missing many experiences so dear to the child of yesterday. Milk is mysteriously delivered at the front door in bottles; butter is purchased from the grocer's in square cartons; cookies come in cellophane packages. Mothers spend so little time in the kitchen these days and rightly so, too, for these mothers and their families are happier as a result. It would be ridiculous, anyway, for a mother to make her own butter—it would be impossible for her to provide her own milk—but she can bake cookies and moreover the child should be allowed to help her with them. Many commercial-made cookies are excellent but they can no way replace the home-made variety. And no child should be allowed to grow up without having experienced the luscious, spicy smell that permeates a home when mother is baking cookies.

Cookies do so much to dress up simple lunch when the children

dash home from school. Cookies and a simple pudding. Cookies and fruit or just cookies by themselves offer a very satisfactory dessert. If your child must carry his lunch, Cookies are indispensable. They are easy to pack, nourishing and deliciously tempting to a hungry child.

Try the suggested recipe and keep your cookie jar full. Your child won't loiter on the way home from school when he knows that a cookie and a tall glass of milk are his for the asking.

Pinwheel Cookies

1 cup butter
1 cup sugar
2 egg yolks
6 tbs milk
3 cups flour
3 tsp baking powder
1-4 tsp salt
1 tsp vanilla
2 squares melted chocolate

Cream butter, add sugar, add egg yolks and beat mixture well. Add milk, then flour which has been sifted with baking powder and salt. Add vanilla. Divide into halves. To one half of this mixture add melted chocolate. Roll white dough into thin sheet. Roll chocolate mixture into sheet of the same size. Place white dough over chocolate and gently press together. Roll as for jelly roll into a tight roll, about 2 inches in diameter.

Set in ice box for several hours until it becomes firm. Cut in 1-4 inch thickness with sharp knife and lay cut side down on greased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate oven of 375 deg. for 8 or 10 minutes. Yield: 8 doz.

Gentlemen: You have asked my candid opinion about Diesel power farming. My experience with power farming dates back to the crude early day tractors, and frankly, I formed some unfavorable prejudices from my first power farming experience.

I am farming 1350 acres of hilly Palouse land about 700 acres wheat each year, where grades are frequently as much as 50%.

I used to keep 40 to 50 horses to do my farming properly (early seeding and plowing before the ground is dried out). This meant that I kept 40 horses 365 days, or 14,600 horse days' feed; actually using an average of only 25 horses 150 days per year. This reduces itself to 3,750 horse days' work. In other words, I fed, kept, or maintained nearly 4 horses for one day's work with one horse.

The great advantage that I find in tractor farming is the matter of getting started quicker in the spring and finishing my spring work so much earlier. This element of time is definitely reflected in my yield.

My "Caterpillar" Diesel is now on its third year of work, and my repairs have amounted to \$28.00 (part of this on my grease gun). Since this amount is a great deal less than harness repair when using horses I am not complaining. My 1935 operation required 1237 hours, or about 120 days work; at a total cost of \$432.23, as follows: 2,178 gal Diesel Fuel Oil \$202.34 Lubricating oil & grease 201.66 Repairs & repairing 28.23 Total \$432.23

This figures .368 cents per hour; and, average expense per day for fuel oil, grease, and all repairs, \$3.68. Not only from my own experience, but from the experience of my friends and neighbors using "Caterpillar" Diesels, I can say very candidly that they are a success; to use your old slogan, "better, quicker, cheaper."

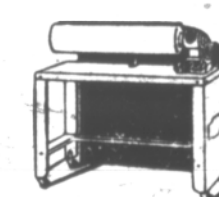
