STRATOSPHERE GONDOLA

Gondola of the stratosphere balloon that carried Major Albert W. Stevens and Captain Orvil A. Anderson of the U. S. Army Air Corps 74,000 feet above the earth will be on display at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition in Portland October 3-10.

Immediately after the showing in Portland, which is sponsored by the National Geographic Society, the gondola will be shipped to the Smithsonian Institute for permanent exhibit. The history making ascent of the Explorer II, which established an all-time altitude record, was made from Rapid City, S. D. November 11, 1935.

The gondola of the Explorer II is but one of many new educational and entertainment features for visitors to the 26th annual Pacific International Livestock Exposition, according to O. M. Plummer, general manager of the West's greatest livestock and land products show.

Entertainment features include a Rodeo which comes as the final of all western shows this year and at which the grand champion cowboy of the world will be selected. Ace bronc riders and top cow hands of the nation will be seen doing their best for a share in the

rich prizes and titles. Bronc riding, bull dogging, bareback riding and Brahma steer riding will all contribute to a generous program of thrills and spills.

Competing for public interest with the Rodeo will be one of the most elaborate horse shows in years, with high stepping blue bloods in all saddle and harness classes competing.

Highlight of the Horse Show will be an exhibition by the United States Army Horse Show Team, a group of selected cavalry officers who are rated as the best riders in the country. They will demonstrate the course of jumps executed at the Olympic games in Berlin.

Advance entries insure a mammoth showing of both livestock and land products for each of the 19 great shows held under the 11-acre roof of the exposition building. These include dairy cattle, beef, swine, fat stock, draft horses, sheep, poultry and pet stock, goats, dogs, land products, dairy products, wild life, 4-H Club and Smith-Hughes vocational exhibits.

"1936 will be another banner year for the Pacific International," predicted Plummer.
