Mrs. Claude Eaton and Mrs. V. V. Rust motored to Hood River where Mr. Eaton is stationed. He returned home with them for the week end.

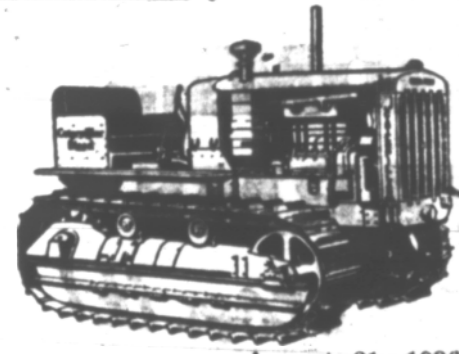
