**WHEAT LEAGUE**

The feeding of wheat has been tried in the mid-west with the result that many feeders there have come to like it for feeding purposes and when mixed with alfalfa hay wheat is equal to corn for most

animals. Fewer pounds of wheat constitute a full feed than for corn. It takes a longer time to bring stock to a full feed of wheat than corn. Charts were shown that indicate the value of wheat where its use is economically justified.

W. S. Nelson closed the Friday afternoon session with a rapid fire statement of the aims of the Inland Empire Waterways Association. He quoted figures on the river and the resources of the country it drains to show that the government would be wise in developing the river in order to increase the value of federal holdings in the northwest.

The annual banquet was held in the Elks temple in Heppner Friday night and the principal talk was made by Dean W. A. Schoenfeld, who represented Governor Charles H. Martin, held in Salem because of a cold and sore throat. About 400 persons attended.

Saturday morning Dean Schoenfeld spoke before the assembly on the methods of success of cooperatives. He charged the managers and the directors with the duty of attaining success and with keeping the members informed on the actions and reasons for actions of the officers.

Ernest Henry, president of the Production Credit Associations of the northwest told of the aims and purposes of his organization and George Hyslop spoke in place of Solon T. White regarding needed legislative changes. Jack Hymeman, who represented the owners of the new style boat that is to be tried on the Columbia spoke for a

few minutes on river shipping. D. E. Stephens told of the crops that might be used as a substitute for wheat under the soil conservation act. A great deal of interest was manifested in his talk and he answered many questions regarding the different crops and their habits of growth. Crested

Wheat grass is still the best substitute for a large part of the dry land wheat belt said Mr. Stephens, although there is constant effort to find some crop better adapted to the soil and climate that will produce more heavily.

Officers elected were Charles Nish, Gilliam county, president;

James Woodell, Union county, vice president; Charles Smith, secretary. The meeting for 1937 will be held in LaGrande, one of the wheat county capitals that has not yet been host to the league membership. T. M. Rolfe of Grass Valley was named as county committeeman for Sherman county.
