Somewhat less than the usual proportions of the previous year's wheat crop was stored on Washington and Oregon farms January 1, according to reports of the Federal Division of Crop and Livestock Estimates.

The total quantity of the two states is estimated at 6,801,000 bushels, or about 2 per cent less than a year ago, and about 19 per cent less than the 5-year average (1928-32) of 8,383,000 bushels. Of the total movement of wheat from farms to elevators and warehouses, 98 to 99 per cent has usually been moved by January 1st. Washington farmers usually carry over 2 or 3 per cent of their wheat crop into the next crop year. The quantities used for feed and seed during the 6 months January 1 - July 1, plus the farm carryover July 1st usually accounts for about 90 per cent of the total wheat stocks on farms as of January 1st.

#### Nothing Provided Beforehand

"Ye have not passed this way heretofore."—Joshua 3:4.

Israel was in a strange land, confronted by an unconquered enemy. The Lord had promised a land flowing with milk and honey. Here was a land over-run with giants living in walled cities; here were wild beasts, insects, poisonous reptiles and many unknown dangers. They needed a calm leader, who could and would perform miracles.

As we begin to wrestle with the problems of the new year, we are reminded of a line from our Latin text: "Titurus, qui nihil anteprovilisset, trpidare." Titurus, since he had provided nothing beforehand, was frightened." Many

Of such characters are NOT wrought such scenes of history as, Horatius at the bridge, Thermopole, Jericho, Nathan Hale swinging from the yard-arm of a British man-of-war. Such personalities do NOT illuminate the path of Progress with the reflection of their martyred bodies, burning at the stake. They are NOT the ones we find ever "toiling up new calvaries."
