you; good measure, pressed together, running over, shall they give unto your bosom. For with what measure you mete it shall be measured to you again"—Luke 6:38  
Here our blessed Lord confirms unto us a law that has been in operation since the beginning of the world. It would have been none the less true had it not received the sanction of Him who came to bear the "truth."

As they journeyed they stumbled over the frozen body of a native Tibetan. The missionary discovered that he still had life in him and said to the priest "We must try to save him." The priest said, "No, I'm going on." Suder Singh lifted the man to his shoulder and struggled on, up over the pass. When barely over he stumbled on another body in the snow which he found to be the priest who had refused to help a fellow countryman. Thus by the strenuous exercise Sadhu Suder Singh had gotten by carrying the fallen man he not only saved the life of another, but preserved his own as well. "Give and it shall be given unto you."
