WHAT IS LENT?

By Lawrence H. Mitchelmore "And when he had fasted forty days and forty nights, he afterward hungered," Matthew 4:2.

At this season of the year when one reads of Lenten recipes, of curtailed social schedules made so by Lent, and special religious services observing Lent, it is only right that the inquisitive individual ask another, "What is Lent? Perhaps the friend is not entirely sure himself.

What is Lent? The word is from the Anglo-Saxon meaning "the season of spring."

What is Lent? Originally it was a period of but forty hours. Later it was 36 days of fasting, omitting all Sundays, and all Saturdays, except one.

What is Lent? It is a semi-fast period of forty days, Sundays excepted, required of the membership of the Lutheran, Protestant Episcopal, Greek and Roman Catholic churches, in commemoration of Jesus Christ's own fast of forty days and forty nights, and a period of preparation for the Easter season. During the forty days one is not expected to take part in amusements, nor eat hearty foods. Thus many fish dishes are planned and prepared.

Though many churches do not require strict observance of Lent, they do encourage special services and meditative periods that when Easter does come members will be ready and waiting to enjoy and appreciate the glorious resurrection morning.

It is possible for Lent to begin as early as February 4, or as late as March 10. This year it began on Wednesday, February 10.

Christian men and women, and boys and girls, it is important that we experience something of the arrest, the death and the resurrection of our Master! This we can do! May we be ready for Easter as the millions of Christ followers who in times past prepared themselves through the medium of the Lenten Spirit.
