Having won second place in the county the Grass Valley boys basketball team will leave Friday for Dufur for the annual tournament. Rufus won first place this year and Wasco third.

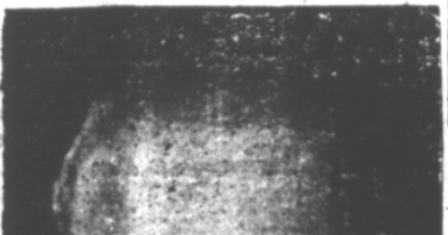
Tentative dates for the debates with Redmond have been set for the week end of March 2 and 3, or 9 and 10. The exact date has not been decided upon as yet.
