UNFORGIVABLE

"With the tongue we bless the Lord and Father, and with the tongue we curse men made in God's Likeness: blessing and cursing stream from the same lips." James III:10. Moffatt

One of the most trying, nay, irritating conditions to be found as a chronic symptom of oragnized Christianity is that described by St. James as quoted above. Verily, it chafes the disposition of the pastor as the unpadded collar chafes the soft shoulders of an unseasoned colt. Only by the unbounded grace of God are we able to still the shrill harpings of temptation and mount to the pulpit on the Sabbath and speak the "few kind words" that save the consciences of the congregation and keep the contributions trickling into the coffers.

"Brethern," says St. James, "This ought not to be." Aye, for what a curse it is!

We know many people who seem to be a blessing to the work of the Kingdom at first inspection, yet who are the very ones who are hindering it most. They work tirelessly, and continuously. But they

have an inveterate propensity of saying mean or slighting things about their fellow members of the church. A lady who is notoriously weak as a musician but wonderfully efficient in other ways is eternally criticizing the music rendered by the lady who is a finished artist as a pianist but woefully lacking in ability otherwise. A man will praise the Lord in prayer and song but call upon all and sundry to witness the evil in Brother Jenks, who holds a higher church office than he.

The wisdom which seeks out and displays the weaknesses of our fellow men is "the wisdom which comes down from above, it is an earthly wisdom, sensuous, devilish; for whatever jealousy and rivalry lacks, there disorder reigns and every evil." (v. 16)

"This," says Safed the Sage, "creates an unholly smell; which, mingling with the insense of the altar, rises to High Heaven to outrage the olfactory senses of the angels and create nausea in the throne room of God."

Incidentally, it multiplies the worries of the pastor and adds numbers by the score to the list of "resident, but inactive members." Murder will out. Well, so will this sort of a situation, even in this high altitude, an unburied corpse does not lend elegance to the adjacent atmosphere.

"One alone, is the legislator, who passes sentence; it is HE who is able to save and destroy; who are you to judge your neighbor?" James II:12. One cannot be saved who sets at naught the good that others do and criticise their efforts.
