Oregon Citizens Have Many Automobiles

One automobile to every three persons by the close of the present registration year will be the record for Oregon if the present rate of increase continues according to a statement released by Earl Snell, Secretary of State.

It is anticipated that registrations during 1937 will smash previous records of motor vehicle registration. Such predictions are based on records made during the first three months of the year.

For the first quarter of this year, 292,854 motor vehicles have been registered, which number represents an increase of approximately 10 per cent over 1936.

Healthy activity in the motor vehicle business is indicated also by the increase in the number of car titles issued. During the period, 66,135 certificates of title were recorded an increase of 8,188 over the previous year, representing an average of over 800 titles per day.

During the quarter, Mr. Snell's office handled 395,606 motor vehicle transactions and \$275,507.78 in fees. Receipts from motor vehicle fees as well as gas tax receipts are turned over periodically to the state highway commission.
