Mrs. Grover Coffman of Moro was a visitor at the C. B. Doyle home Tuesday.

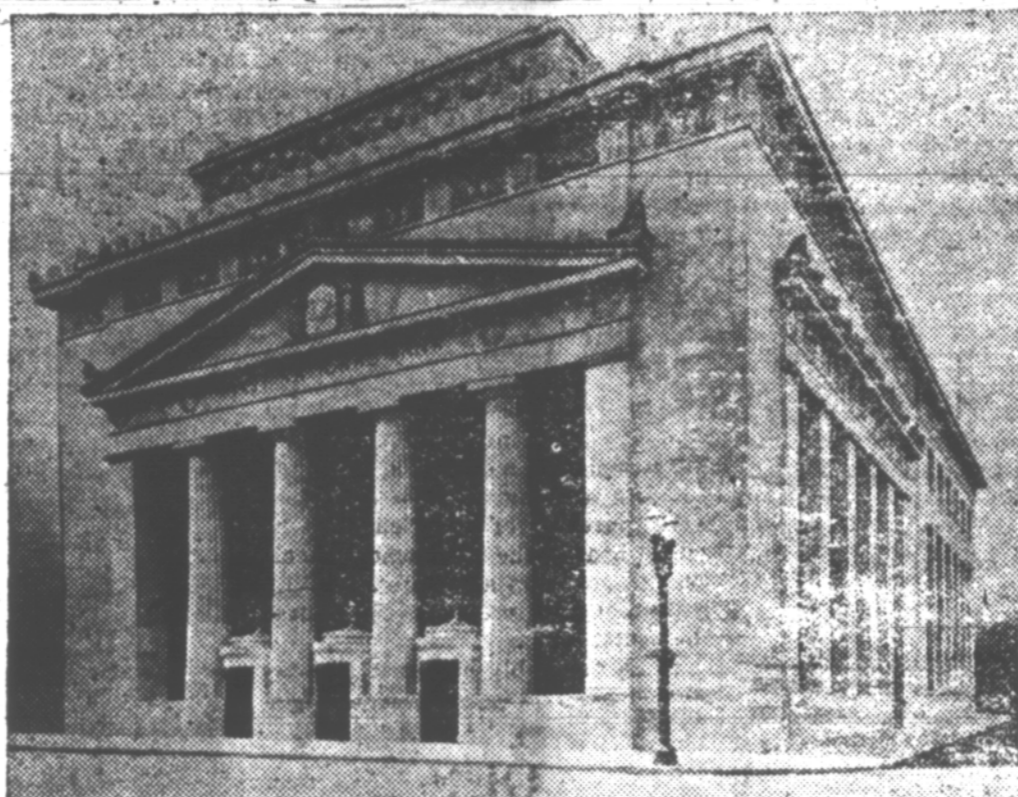
Mr. and Mrs. Buck Miller were in The Dalles Wednesday bringing her sister Erma Wells home with them to remain for a while.

OREGON'S TRAFFIC DEATHS
A Series of Weekly Articles on the Problem of Highway Safety by Earl Snell, Secretary of State

The people of Oregon are charged with the inability to control properly their motor cars. The pedestrians are charged with gross negligence, thoughtlessness and utter carelessness.

The evidence is an increase of 80 per cent in motor vehicle traffic fatalities for the month of March 1937 over March 1936. Twenty-seven were killed in traffic accidents this year as compared to 15 in the same month of '36.

Eleven of the 27 fatalities were pedestrians.

This is a terrible record for the state of Oregon but more important is the human suffering and sadness brought to the homes of happy families. It may strike at your door next, for in spite of all constructive, worthwhile efforts being advanced in the hope of reducing motor vehicle accidents the trail grows longer and bloodier.

Newspapers in every section of the state are generously cooperating with my office in placing before the public a true picture of the situation. A series of weekly articles will be published in this paper, dealing particularly with accident records in this state, and supplying information of general interest regarding our laws and traffic regulations. An effort will be made to present these matters in such a manner that the readers will not only become familiar with conditions but will also become conscious of the seriousness of the situation.

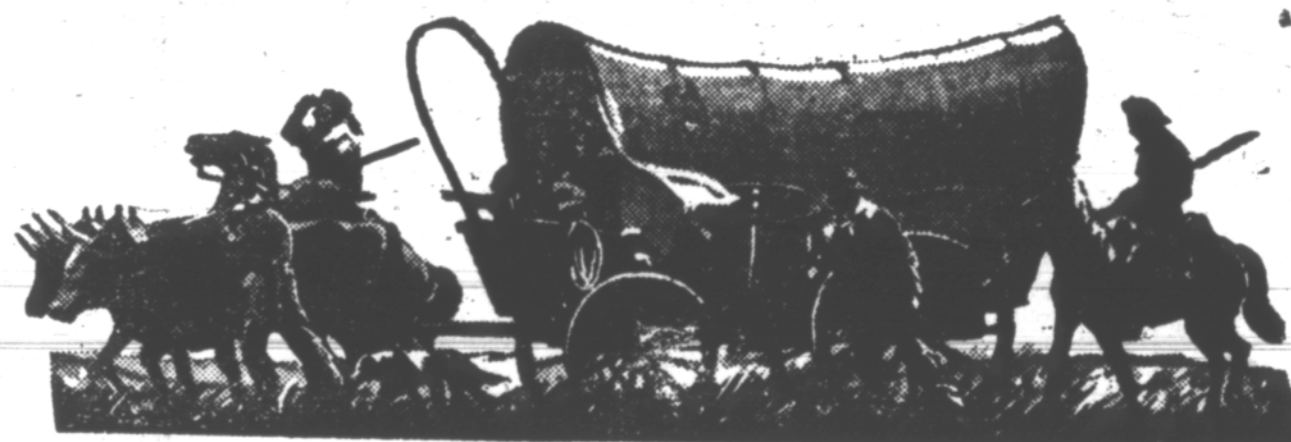
