Late Spring Slows Crops of All Kinds

The growing season has been so backward in the country as a whole as well as in Oregon, that the possibility of production being too great this year does not seem very serious, says the monthly review of the agricultural situation just released by the extension service at Oregon State college. To some extent, however, farmers will probably overcome a part of the unfavorable effects of the cold weather on crops by using more fertilizer, and by giving increased attention to the crops being planted.

The sentiment is quite optimistic in agricultural areas generally, and farmers are reported to be buying more machinery and equipment than for several years. The producers are encouraged by the relatively high prices current for most farm products despite the untrend in costs.

Index numbers given in the report show that, with the general level of farm prices at approximately 130 per cent of the prewar average and costs at 134 per cent, the purchasing power of farm products is within three points of "parity." This is the most favorable exchange relationship enjoyed by agriculture for many years.

Compared with the 1926-30 average level, farm prices in Oregon average approximately 93 per cent as high, a gain of 21 points over the level of a year ago. The advance is attributed to the scarcity caused by the drought of 1936 and the rapid increase in consumer purchasing power during the past year. On this point, the report shows a gain of 22 points in the factory payroll index from April 1936 to April 1937—almost exactly proportionate to the gain in average farm prices in Oregon.

In addition to the general review topics and a review of the trend of land values, the circular contains valuation summaries with respect to wheat, rye, hay, pastures and ranges, dairy, poultry, potatoes, onions, fruits and nuts, with comparative price and market data on these and many other commodities. Copies are available from county agricultural agents.

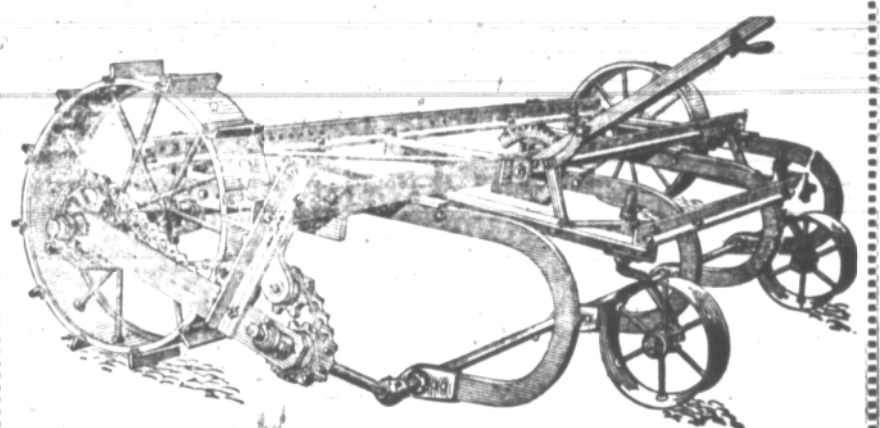
